The following narrative is a compilation of any and every bit of information that I could find, whether on the internet at sites such as ancestry.com, genealogy forums, histories of the various areas involved, census records, legal documents, or personal correspondence. Because I'm using such a variety of sources, there is little uniformity in spelling of names, and often not in dates. I've tried to filter out bad information and be consistent in what I include.

That said, there are many variations that occur in people's names, and it can get very confusing, particularly considering how often children were named for their parents or other close relatives. I wish I knew how people referred to themselves, but usually there is no way for us to know. In a few cases, such as a signature or a reference on a legal document, we may be able to determine an accurate name, but people aren't always consistent about they signed their names. Many times names were spelled as they sounded, so you can find numerous variations.

In this situation, we have two men named Newbold Cannon. I don't think I've seen the elder Newbold referred to as "Sr," only as Newbold.

Depending on the source, the younger Newbold might be Newbold Cannon, Newbold J. Cannon, NJ Cannon, Newbold J. Cannon, Jr., etc. In Newbold Cannon's will, he calls his own son Newbold J. Cannon. I'd use that approach, but the younger Newbold signs his name NJ on legal documents pertaining to his father's estate. He always used NJ on census records. On deeds and land purchases he might be Newbold J. Cannon or NJ Cannon. I actually have never seen what the "J" might stand for. It's interesting that the Sr. doesn't have a J initial, so I wonder if the J is an abbreviation for Junior.

I will use Newbold for the elder, NJ for the younger. If there is a confusion that arises because I'm quoting a source that is using another style, I'll try to make a note of it.

I've transcribed many legal documents. As best as I could, I transcribed verbatim what I read, including what might be considered misspellings. I like the historical value and the charm of using the spelling as it was originally done, but am also leery of changing spelling to fit what I think they were trying to say; I might not understand 18<sup>th</sup> century jargon, and could make errors. So, other than the possible typo on my part, 'misspellings' in the transcribed documents follow from the original. Occasionally I added bold type so that I would be able to easily notice particularly important information, such as the bold type used in Newbold's papers saying that his property included a log house.

# **Unicy Bounds**

I have had little luck finding information on Unicy's early life. There is a rootsweb genealogy for the Bounds family that seems to have good information. It suggests this:

Jesse Bounds, b. 1735/1745, Somerset County, MD, m. Comfort Waples (birthdate unknown) marriage date unknown, d. before 1790, Sussex County, MD.

Comfort Waples parents were Burton and Comfort Waples (that's it for information).

The intermarrying between the Burtons and Waples will get confusing:

<u>Comfort Burton</u> was born 28 APR 1724, and died 5 APR 1796. She married <u>Burton Waples</u>, son of William Peter Waples and Mary Burton. He was born 10 FEB 1718/1719 in ,Sussex, Delaware, USA, and died ABT 1796 in , Sussex, Delaware, USA.

Jesse Bounds' parents were Jacob Bounds, b. 1710, Somerset County, MD; m. Mary Miller; d. after 1773.

Jacob Bounds' parents were William Bounds, b. 1667, VA; m. Mary about 1698, Somerset, MD; d. 9/18/1713, Somerset, MD. He was a planter.

William Bounds' parents were John Bounds, b. about 1625, London, England, or 1646, Nothumberland, VA, m. Ann Hiam (b. about 1651, Dorchester, MD); d. 12/1700, Somerset, MD; b. Somerset, MD.

John married Ann about 1665/1674 in Northumberland, VA, or Dorchester, MD.

Ann Hiam, b. 1651, Dorchester, MD; m. John Bounds, d. 8/6/1677, Somerset, MD; buried Tipquian, Somerset, MD, on plantation.

John emigrated in 1661 from England

It goes further back in England on the Bounds' side.

Another researcher at rootsweb had this. Notice she doesn't include Unicy, possibly because the court-ordered orphans claim didn't include Unicy, who was probably already married.

The birth date of Jesse is thought to be between 1735/45 in Somerset County Maryland. No records exist of the births during his time. He married **Comfort** Waples the daughter of Burton Waples and Comfort Waples. His land was on the Nanticoke River, originally patented in Maryland but later taken up in a resurvey of boundaries and patented in Sussex County Delaware. He was a planter. Only two of his children are known. The will of Burton Waples made on 16 August 1796 in Sessex Co. Delaware named grandsons Jacob and William Bounds, and daughter Comfort King. Jesse died by 1790 in Sussex County and his widow remarried Charles King.

Jesse witnessed the will in 1779 of his brother Jacob Bounds. On 22 February 1776 John Penn sold to Jesse Bounds 150 acres on Broad Creek, in Parsons Neck, Nanticoke 100. Sussex County Delaware land warrants on 23 February 1776 granted this 150 acres adjacent Broad Creek, including improvements in Nanticoke 100, ADDITION TO LIBERTY on the northwest side of Bounds' Maryland patent called MY DELIGHT and Bounds' patent ADDITION belonging to Jesse Bounds.

There was at the same time in Sussex County Delaware an Anthony Bounds who could have been a brother of Jesse. In 1808 Jesse Wright with wife Sarah Wright gave to daughter Amelia Bounds. Susex County Delaware. None of these Bounds have been identified. On 2 November 1790 the accounts of Jesse Bounds, deceased were filed. Distribution was made to Charles King with wife Comfort King, late Bounds. The Orphans Court docket of 4 May 1798 ordered an evaluation of the lands of Jacob and William Bounds minor sons of Jesse, by Charles King, guardian. The lands were in Broad Creek 100. The estimation was made by James Gunby, Jonathan Boyce and John Benson and accepted on 17 November 1798.

I found a record for Unicy Bound's father, Jesse, in 1803 Tax List of Broad Creek Hundred, Sussex County, Delaware, Taken by Mitchell Kershaw beginning 27 September 1803. This record speaks of Jesse Bounds 'heirs.' If Jesse Bounds died in Sussex, DE, it's most likely his daughter, who married before his death, married in Sussex.

Which leads me to think that Charles and Esther Unknown Cannon, Newbold's parents, were from Delaware, and that's how Newbold and Unicy met. In fact, there are MANY Cannons in that area at that time.

The census in 1800 Broadcreek Hundred lists Jacob, Eijah, Joseph, Ebenezer, Sarah and James Cannon households. Don't know if/how this connects with us.

# **Newbold and Unicy Bounds Cannon in Delaware**

Newbold Cannon and his wife, Unicy Bounds Cannon, married in Sussex, Delaware, probably about 1796.

Their early history has been challenging to find. Even something as fundamental as their marriage date seems to be a problem, if it's true that they began having children in 1791. It's possible that other researchers, who use the 1796 date, found someone else' record. It's highly unlikely that they weren't married when their first child was born; could be a second marriage for one of them...

While I'm not trying to create their parents' histories yet, I did do a cursory search for Bounds and Cannon families in that area.

Newbold's parents: Father: Charles Cannon Mother: Esther Unknown Children of Charles and Esther Unknown Cannon are:

From what we know, Newbold was the only child of Charles and Esther Cannon to move to Missouri; however, he had at least two siblings living in the same area as he had in Kentucky. Actually, George died about the time Newbold and family moved to MO; Henry had died many years prior.

# Newbold and Unicy Bounds Cannon in Virginia & Kentucky

The Cannons moved with other family members to the Greenbrier area of Virginia (now West Virginia) before moving to Bath County, KY, where they were by the early 1800's. We know that they were in the Flemingsburg, KY, area by 1823, from a reference, quoted later, about 'Squire Cannon.'

I found records for Benoni Coshow, father-in-law of two of Newbold's brothers. Coshow died in Bath County, KY in 1810; however, he is on the 1810 census of Montgomery County, KY, listed very close to two Hawkins families (other Hawkins families lower on same page).

There is an 1810 census, Montgomery County, KY, for Agnes Cannon, the widow of Henry Cannon

I printed copies of George and Henry Cannon's wills, filed in Bath County, KY. They are the sons-in-law of Benoni Coshow, above.

# **Children of Newbold and Unicy Bounds Cannon**

Newbold and Unicy had 12 children, beginning in 1791 with Kirkman. Their last child, Newbold J. Cannon, (NJ) was born in KY.

- 1. Kirkman Cannon, b. 5/20/1791, DE; d. 9/3/1807 perhaps; death date taken from LeMaster Cannon Bible.
- 2. Esther Cannon Crooks, b. 9/12/1792, DE; m. John Crooks, 7/8/1812, Bath County, KY; d. after 1853 (per legal documents concerning Esther and Newbold Jr as part of Newbold Sr will), presumably Lewis County, MO.
- 3. Sarah Sally Cannon Hawkins, b. 2/4/1794, Bath County, KY; m. Gregory Farmer Hawkins, 1/13/1815, Bath County, KY; d. 4/22/1872, Canton Twp., Lewis County, MO; buried in Wyaconda Baptist Church Cemetery, Canton Twp., Lewis County, MO.
- 4. George Cannon, b. 2/4/1797, presumably Bath County, KY; d. before 1835 presumably, date of Newbold's first will.
- 5. Henry Cannon b. 9/10/1798, Bath County, KY, presumably; m. Elizabeth Dean Crooks 1/8/1824, Bath County, KY; d. 9/1/1830, Canton Twp., Lewis County, MO; buried in Wyaconda Baptist Church Cemetery, Canton Twp., Lewis County, MO. Marion County had not split into Lewis County at the time of his death. His property was in what is now Canton Twp., Lewis County, MO.
- 6. James Cannon, b. 9/10/1878, Bath County, KY, presumably. Twin to Henry.
- 7. Clement Cannon, b. 2/23/1800, Bath County, KY, presumably; m. Sarah Sally Freeman, 2/28/1882, Bath County, KY; d. 5/1855, per online trees. He is not on the 1856 census with his family.
- 8. Nancy Cannon McPherson, b. 9/10/1801, Bath County, KY, presumably; m. Jesse McPherson, 12/31/1824, Bath County, KY; d. before 7/1859, TX, presumably. (Date is when her widower Jesse McPherson married her sister Malinda Cannon Beckner).
- 9. William Cannon, b. 3/8/1803, Bath County, KY, presumably; d. after 1833 census, Canton Twp., Lewis County, MO, before Newbold Cannon's 1<sup>st</sup> will written in in 1835.
- 10. John B. Cannon, b. 10/29/1804, Bath County, KY, presumably; m. Nancy Iler, 1/5/1826, Ohio County, KY; d. 4/1852, presumably Canton Twp., Lewis County, MO. His will was probated 4/26/1862.
- 11. Malinda Cannon Beckner McPherson, b. 7/28/1807, Bath County, KY, presumably; m. 1<sup>st</sup> Thomas Locke Beckner, 1/19/1826, Bath County, KY; m. 2<sup>nd</sup> Jesse McPherson, 7/27/1859, Lewis County, MO (widower of sister Nancy Cannon McPherson); d. 4/6/1884, Pettis County, MO; buried in Bethlehem Baptist Cemetery, Pettis County, MO.



From the above we know that Newbold and Unicy Bounds Cannon were in Kentucky prior to 1823.


I really don't know who is represented on the 1810 census....the names I used are their children, but that doesn't mean that my assignment of names is accurate. It really doesn't fit very well at all.

# OLD SETTLERS.

Among the first, if not the very first settlers, within what is now "Lewis County," were John Bozarth, with his sons Reason and Ira, and his sons-in-law. John Finley and William Weaver, who settled in the Mississippi bottom below La Grange, in about 1816. Then came Captain William Pritchard and Aaron Claffin, about the year 1818. And in 1825, those native-born Missourians, the Durkees, Roswell, Lucien, Gen. Chauncy, and Henry J.; all dead but Henry, now living in Canton, in this county. Stephen Cooper and the Tates in 1829. In 1830, came Newbold Cannon and his sons, the Beckner's, Brown's, Dickerson Hawkins, Gregory F. McReynolds; in 1829, Silas Ramsey. The Smith's, Frank, Rice, Ralph, and Billy; William L. Graves, Silas, and Remson Reddish, Elisha Lefler, the Crook's, Capt. Marlow. The Frazier's, Bourn's, William and Abner with his sons, Frank, Ambrose, Douglass, Levi and Dudley .-Martin Nall and the Richardsons. Nathaniel and his sons, James A., Francis, and Preston; Edward White, Robert Sinclair, and Isaac Bland, John Reddish, and Nathaniel Preston, and James Hall; the Smoot's, Middleton and William; McPheeter's, John, William and Bowman; the Longs, Gabriel, and Reuben; Daniel Easley, Samuel Allen. Samuel Allen was the first settler in what is now Salem Township. William Cecil, of Reddish. Reuben and Gabriel Long, brothers, in what is now Highland. The Briscoes were here in 1832, and doubtless many others, the date of whose settlement is unknown to the writer.

The first settlers of the county were chiefly Virginians and Kentuckians. A few from the then "middle states," with here and there the "irrepressible Yankee." They were a hardy race of men; strong, physically and intellectually; such as in all ages have made states, and founded empires. They were distinguished for their honesty, generosity and hospitality. The "latch string" was always out: indeed "latch strings" were all the fastenings they had. Bolts and bars locks, and keys, were almost unknown, nor were they needed; modern, refined, civilization had not as yet, sat down among them, with its many and varied virtues and accomplishments. Neither were these men and their women, nameless adventurers, "without a local habitation and a name," but, on the contrary, almost all were of respectable lineage, and many of them of the best blood in the land.

An illustrated historical atlas of Lewis County, Missouri, 1878.

I bought a CD entitled 'Lewis County, MO, History 1887' which is a collection of 1800 era maps, and a book of the county's history published in 1887. It is fascinating reading. It's several hundred pages in length, and the 'search' feature doesn't work, so it will have to be read. I found entries mentioning the Hawkins family (see the index). In the body of the book I found Gregory Hawkins mentioned; it stands to reason that we will find others in the family. On page 148 (the original page number) Gregory Hawkins is said to be recommended for justice of the peace of Canton Township.

Canton Township comprises the northeastern portion of the county lying immediately upon the Mississippi, and constituting one of the very best townships in Northeast Missouri. The town of Canton, nine miles of railroad, and some of the best farms in the county, are within its limits. The magnificent river bluffs furnish an abundance of excellent limestone, the hills along the streams are covered with timber, and good water and fine soil are to be found on every section. Some of the land on the hills, not now in cultivation, is well adapted to vine culture and doubtless will ere long be thus utilized. There need be very little so-called waste land in this township.

A township called Canton was first organized by the county court of Marion, while this territory yet formed a part of that county. It then extended north to the Iowa line. Subsequently, from time to time, other townships and even counties, were formed out of it and its limits very much reduced, but the name it still retained.

In addition to the land entries recorded in the first chapter of this volume, the following were made within what is now Canton Township, by actual residents, between the years 1830 and 1840. It is believed that in nearly every instance the settlement was practically identical with the land entry, and was made not long prior or subsequent thereto:

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Between the years of 1826? and 1830, the Cannons, along with many if not all of their living children, their in-laws, slaves, and some of their neighbors, moved to Marion County, MO, which later became Lewis County. Many of these families were original land patent holders.

Newbold and Unicy apparently financially helped at least two of their daughters in land transactions. The dealings with Malinda and her husband Thomas L. Beckner seemed to effect the writing of Newbold's will.

Unicy died shortly after arriving in MO, and has one of the first marked graves in the area. She is buried on land that Newbold gave to the Wyaconda Baptist Church in 1841. The church, while rebuilt several times, is still at that location, along with the graves of many of the Cannons and their extended family.

Newbold, a slaveholder, emancipated one of his slaves Priscilla, in an early will he recorded in 1838, and again in a will filed in 1850. In 1845 he deeded a slave boy to her. From what we've been told, this emancipation didn't take place as Newbold directed. From papers filed with his probate, son NJ states that he has possession of Priscilla and the boy she was deeded, and later NJ asks the estate to reimburse him for his court time and troubles with "Cillas," as he called her in his bill to the estate.

While Newbold emancipated Priscilla, he didn't free all of his slaves. Several are left to his children as their portion of his estate, some are sold at the sale following his death.

# **Slavery in NE Missouri**

#### STATE OF MISSOURI.

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Some of the first settlers of the county were slave owners, and brought their peculiar chattels with them. The first mention of slavery in the records is dated in October, 1834, and is an order of the county court permitting Reuben Long, administrator of the estate of Meshach Birchfield, to hire out the "slaves of said estate."

Besides the control and authority vested by law in the master over his slaves, they were kept under other restrictions. Usually they were not allowed off of their master's plantation after 9 o'clock at night without a written pass from him. Sambo would steal away to a neighboring farm and spend twothirds of the night in the company of a dusky sweetheart, or go prowling about the country on one frolic or another, and then the next day he would fall asleep over his plow and be incapable of half a fair day's work. It was the practice in all slave holding States, where slaves existed in any considerable number, to have a company of mounted police, appointed by the county court, in every civil township, whose duties were to patrol that township a stated number of hours in every month, and who were paid for their services out of the county treasury. patrols, as they were called, made their rounds after nightfall, and nearly always at unexpected times. If they caught a negro away from home without a pass, he was usually given a sound whipping, and sometimes was taken into custody, and his master sent for.

It became necessary to appoint patrols for Canton and Dickerson Townships, in this county, as early as in January, 1836, and they were directed to patrol for twenty-four hours in every month. Those for Canton Township were Elias Sinclair, captain; James Armstrong, Diederich Huner, William Duncan, James Crooks, Ellsworth Owsley and Alex Brown. Those for Dickerson were A. P. Williams, captain; Ralph Smith, B. P. Major, John Snapp, Eli Finley and Samuel Cox, Jr.

It was made a penal offense for a master to allow a slave to exercise any jurisdiction over himself. He could not himself, enter into a contract, or make a purchase of merchandise. In at least three instances merchants of this county were indicted for "trading with a slave" and in the summer of 1836 Mrs.

Catherine Hayden was indicted and arraigned for "permitting a slave to hire his own time." A year later the case was dismissed because the prosecuting witness, B. P. Major, had left the country.

Free negroes were not allowed to reside in the State without a special permit from a county court, and might be placed under bonds for their good and orderly behavior. The first free negroes licensed to live in this county were Jack, Isaac, Sally, Harriet and Hannah, all of whom had belonged to Jacob Myers, deceased, who, before his death, had manumitted them. The license was granted in March, 1836. From time to time other free negroes were granted permission to reside here. After the Myers slaves, heretofore mentioned, the first slave emancipated in this county, as appears of record, was "Chaney," a negro woman, who was set free by her master, John E. Thomas, in July, 1840.

I Newbald Cannon being of sound & disposing mind and wishing to provide for the uncertainty of human life do make establish and ordain this as my last will & testament hereby revoking cancelling and setting aside all former will testament & whatsoever. First I hereby will & bequeath my servant girl Eliza aged about sixteen to my daughter Nancy McPherson at my death. Secondly I will & bequeath at my death my servant girl Nancy aged about fourteen to my Daughter Malinda Beckner & it is further my will and desire that my servant girl priscilla be free from servitude or slavery at my death & it is further my will and desire that after my (death) & the payment of all debts the remainder of my property both real personal and misced? be divided equally & impartially between my following named children including the heirs of Henry Cannon deceased (viz) Easter Crooks Sarah Hawkins Newbald Cannon, Clement Cannon John Cannon & the heirs of Henry Cannon deceased. And lastly it is my will & desire Jesse McPherson & Thomas L. Beckner execute this my last will and tesstament for which purpose I hereby (appoint) them executors to execute accordingly. 
Notice in the above will that Priscilla is to be 'free from servitude or slavery at my death.' There is no mention of supporting her, or of giving her a slave boy Thomas H. Benton, which Newbold does do later (1845). Thomas wasn't born when the original will was written. Another interesting item is that in this will Jesse McPherson and Thomas L. Beckner are to be his executors; later Newbold J. Cannon is named executor. (note: the legal document says Newbold J. Cannon) Newbold will re-write his will in 1846, and it will be filed after his death.

I don't know why this was written in 1835, but not filed until 1838.



Newbold will give this land to the Wyaconda Baptist Church in 1841, which still owns it today.









#### LeMaster Bible, Newbold's slaves

This Bible, which apparently belonged to Richard and/or Abraham LeMasters originally, included the birth years of Newbold and his siblings, and of his children. Also is a page of Newbold Cannon's slaves names and birthdates.

The Bible came down through Newbold J NJ Cannon's line, to his daughter, Unise Amaranthus Cannon Herrell. Her descendants have possession of it, I believe.

The following quote is from worldconnect.com. It quotes the "LeMaster Bible," (see section at the end of this narrative concerning the LeMaster Bible). It's not clear to anyone online why Cannons are mentioned, but the birth dates of Newbold and Unicy's children, and the births of slaves are listed. These same slave names reappear in Newbold's will. I include this here because chronologically it fits the years between 1830 and 1850:

Children's names and dates from bible of Richard or Abraham LeMasters.

Also lists children of two slaves who were given to his daughters in his will.

## CHURCH HISTORY

The Wyaconda Baptist Church, one and one-half miles west of Canton, Missouri, was organized August 30, 1829, and is the oldest church in Lewis County and all of Northeast Missouri.

The Reverend Jeremiah Taylor organized the church with twenty constituent members. A partial list includes Mr. and Mrs. Newbold Cannon, Mr. and Mrs. Justinian Mills, Mr. and Mrs. James Thomas, Mr. and Mrs. Robert St. Clair, Mrs. Hunsicker, Mrs. Oder, Mrs. John Crooks (Newbold Cannon's daughter), and Mrs. Elizabeth Cannon (Newbold's daughter-in-law), who later became Mrs. Elizabeth Lefler.

The church was first located below LaGrange and met in private homes, but subsequently moved to its present site in 1831. A tract of land for the church and cemetery described as follows: "being part of the Southwest fourth of the Southeast Quarter of Section 33, Township 62 North, Range 6 West, commencing at 2 Elm Trees 3 poles West of Huner's Spring, thence with Huner's line 32 poles South to a stake, thence West 20 poles to a stake, thence North 32 poles to a stone on Huner's Spring Branch, thence East 20 poles to a place of beginning, containing 4 acres, more or less," was donated by Newbold Cannon. Trustees' names on the deed dated 1841 are Elias Thompson, Aaron Lewis, Joseph Bridwell, and Richard Lafon.

#### The First Building

The first church, a hewed log building, was erected the early part of 1831. Desiring a building without inner walls, a 24 x 36 foot church was built in the shape of a cross. The pulpit was in one square of the long part of the building and the entrance in the other. Rev. James M. Lillard, who was one of the best-known preachers of his day, dedicated the church in 1837. He organized a score of pioneer churches, performed the rites of baptism for more than 3000 persons, and was the first resident pastor in Lewis County.

The cemetery east of the church was laid out in 1831, and the first grave was that of a charter member, Unicy, wife of Newbold Cannon, who died September 23, 1831.

The congregation grew and prospered, and in 1856 a  $40 \times 60$  foot brick building replaced the original log church at a cost of \$2,200. In 1890 this building was replaced by a small frame building, which was destroyed by fire on December 2, 1945.

The fire was a blow almost too much for the small church to bear, as only five persons – Mr. and Mrs. Roy Bertram, Mr. Fred Gamm, Miss

Florence Childress, and Mr. George Schneider– had attended services that morning and it was struggling to keep alive. A few remaining members met in a called session to discuss rebuilding and voted unanimously to rebuild the church. The \$2,000 that Miss Sarah Lillard willed the church had been invested until it had accumulated the sum of \$5,000, and with great sacrifice by the few active members it was possible to rebuild. The church was completed two years later. The new house of worship was dedicated Sunday, November 30, 1947, before a large crowd.

#### Today's Membership

The current church membership of 70 has sixteen direct descendents of Newbold and Unicy Cannon. George Hoffman, a former Sunday School superintendent and trustee, and Lester Hoffman, a deacon, are great, great, great grandsons, and Duane Job, a deacon and trustee is a great, great, great grandson. All three have children and grandchildren of who are members of the church. Duane's grandson, Jeremy Geisendorfer, is now a trustee of the church which adds two more generations of service to the Lord. Jeremy and his wife have a two-year old daughter who represents another generation to attend the church.

Even though many of the members are related by blood directly back to the founders of the Wyaconda Baptist Church, all the members of this church are related by the blood of our Savior Jesus Christ and through the grace of God may this "Beacon on the hill" remain for another 175 years or until Jesus returns.

The pulpit was in one square of the long part of the building and the entrance in the other. It was dedicated in 1837 by Rev. James M. Lillard, who was one of the best known preachers of his day. He organized a score of pioneer churches, performed the rites of baptism for more than 3000 persons, and was the first resident pastor in Lewis County.

Rev. Taylor was succeeded by Elds. Mordecia Boulware, "Billy" Fuqua, Eli Merrill, James M. Holt and Col. John Winters. Eli Merrill adopted the views of Alexander Campbell, and was excluded from the fellowship of the Wyaconda Church during the time of his pastorate. In 1833 Eld. James M. Lillard was chosen to the pastoral office and continued uninterruptedly for seventeen years.

The congregation grew and prospered, and in 1856 a 40 x 60 foot brick edifice was erected on the same site at a cost of \$2,200. In 1890 this building was replaced by a smaller frame building which was destroyed by fire December 2, 1945. The Canton Fire Department was called and made a valiant effort to save the church, but due to insufficient water supply, its work proved unsuccessful.

### Personal Histories

Newbold and Unicy (Bounds) Cannon

Newbold Cannon was born March 18, 1767, in Greenbriar, Virginia, and Unicy Bounds Cannon, his wife, was born February 4, 1766, also in Greenbriar, Virginia. They later moved to Kentucky, thence on into Missouri coming from Bath County, Kentucky, in either 1928 or 1829. Newbold Cannon, his wife Unicy, and at least one of their daughters, Sarah Cannon Hawkins, who with her husband, Gregory F. Hawkins and their eight children (they had 11 in all) and their slaves went to Maysville, Kentucky, and took a boat on the Ohio River. At Cairo, Illinois, they re-embarked and ascended the Mississippi as far as Hannibal. From there they went by land to Canton, Missouri, arriving on the day on which the first town lots were sold. Newbold Cannon settled on land that now joins the Wyaconda Baptist Church property. He owned 160 acres in this locality and gave four acres of this acreage for the Wyaconda Baptist Church and Cemetery.

According to a biographical sketch of Newbold Cannon written by Sarah Hawkins Bayne, a great granddaughter, it is stated that Newbold Cannon was a cordial and hospitable man. He was a Baptist and his Bible was very much in evidence in his home. Newbold and Unicy Cannon were charter members of the Wyaconda Baptist Church when it was organized in 1829. Newbold Cannon's daughter, Sarah Cannon Hawkins, and her husband, Gregory F. Hawkins, could not agree on their religion since her father was a very strong Baptist and her husband was of the Episcopal tradition and she could not see her way clear to becoming a member of a church with so much ritual, they then compromised on the Methodist Episcopal and were charter members of that faith established in Canton. Speculation has it that Unicy was named for the Biblical Eunice, commended in Acts and Timothy, pronounced according to the classical rule.

Both Newbold and Unicy are buried in the Wyaconda Cemetery. Newbold died January 8, 1850, and Unicy Cannon's grave is the oldest marked grave in the cemetery, having died September 23, 1831. Many other descendants of Newbold and Unicy Cannon are buried in this same cemetery as well as many other descendents of the charter members of this church

There are presently fourteen direct descendents of Newbold and Unicy Cannon that are members of this church. George Hoffman, the Sunday School Superintendent, and Lester Hoffman, a deacon, are great, great, great grandsons, and Duane Job, a trustee, is a great, great, great, great grandson.

The Wyaconda Baptist Church was organized August 30, 1829, as the first church in Lewis County, Missouri. It was first located one mile below LaGrange, Missouri, but subsequently moved to its present site in this log structure that was built in 1829. Newbold Cannon and wife, Unicy Bounds Cannon, gave the four acres for the church and cemetery and Newbold's wife, Unicy, was the first burial in the cemetery in 1831. This may well be the oldest marked grave in Lewis County. The church was organized by Jeremiah Taylor with twenty charter members. A partial list of the charter members are: Robert Sinclair and wife, James Thomas and wife, Newbold Cannon and wife, Mrs. Crooks, Mrs. Cannon (probably the wife of Newbold J. Cannon a son of Newbold), Mrs. Elizabeth Cannon (wife of Henry Cannon--another son of Newbold who was killed by the Indians--and Elizabeth then married Elisha Lefler), Justian Mills and wife, Mrs. Hunsicker, Mrs. Odor, and others. Wyaconda with three other churches first belonged to Salt River Association, then in 1834 when Bethel Association was organized became a part of this Association. In 1844 when Wyaconda Association was organized, it was one of the eight churches and the place where the churches met to organize.

In a speech delivered by Dr. Madison C. Hawkins, a grandson of Newbold Cannon, on July 4, 1871, at the Old Settlers meeting at the fair grounds, Canton, Missouri. Dr. Hawkins related some of the hardships that the early settlers faced

"They had scarcely prepared cabins to shelter themselves when one of those catastrophes, that do not occur once in a century overwhelmed them with sorrow. On the 29th day of December, 1830, the snow began to fall as never before had been seen by the Indians, who said the great spirit was angry with them. After two or three days it was found to be about four feet deep, but it soon settled to about three, and remained so until late in the spring. The deer turkey and smaller game became almost extinct, and all nature wore the white robe of death. The Indian's wigwam afforded but a scanty protection from the fury of the storm. Want pressed heavily upon many that were not used to it. Delicacies that had been brought with them were consumed, and hominy and pounded meal, with turkeys that could be picked off the limbs of the trees, and deer that could be run down in a few hundred yards, afforded subsistence for all. 'Snowed in' has a terrible meaning for all who survived that of 1830-31. The next spring was very backward, and the corn that was planted chiefly upon the sod was frost bitten, and as wheat was not grown, flour could not be purchased--frost bitten corn made very poor bread--the next year there was no seed corn, as that which had been frosted would not grow, and it was so late before seed corn could be obtained, that it was again ruined by the frost, thus, for two years, the luxury of starvation was almost coveted. Satisfying the cravings of hunger by eating bread made from grated frostbitten corn was scarcely preferable. But men of iron will, engaged in planting civilization in the wilds of Missouri, were not be deterred from an enterprise of so much importance. By such casualties they had endured common sufferings and made sacrifices that humanity wove into a web of congeniality that even wars tempestuous blast could not sever."

The establishment of this little church on a hill was certainly met with many hardships but these early settlers were hardy, determined people that had a vision and were determined to establish a new life in this rugged wilderness. These visions could only be acquired by overcoming difficulties and triumphing over adversity.

Wyadonda Baptist Church history, MC Hawkins speech

Wyaconda. - This church was organized in 1831, with Rev. Jeremin ah Taylor as pastor. The original members were Robert Sinclair and wife, James Thomas and wife, Newbold Cannon and wife, Mrs. Crooks, Mrs. Cannon, Justinian Mills and wife, Mrs Hunsicker and Mrs. Oder. The first building was of log, but was replaced with a commodious brick, 40x60 feet, costing \$2,-200. The church is situated two and a half miles west of Canton, in Canton Township. When finished e it was dedicated by the Rev. James M. Lillard. The pastors serving the church was Revs. Eti Merrill, S "Billy" Fuqua, James M Lillard, James M. Holt and Col. John Winter. The present church is a frame building.



#### NJ and Elizabeth borrowed money from Newbold, Sr. and Robert M. Easton

In 1842, NJ and Elizabeth Ann Cannon signed a mortgage document between themselves, NJ's father, Newbold, and Robert M. Easton, wherein they borrowed \$210.75. The money was given to: "John Shanks one note of one hundred and four dollars, to bank at Palmyra Eighty Dollars, to John Devilbert twenty six6 dollars & 75 cents and also forty dollars." Given as security for this loan was the following property: W ½ SE ¼ Section 17, Township 62, Range 6 West, containing 80 acres. Signed June 10, 1842.

In the margin of this document is written: "We the Administrators of Robert M. Easton deceased acknowledge to have received full satisfaction of the amount due said deceased on this mortgage and relinquish all our claim to the same Nov. 14, 1845."





#### Sheriff Deed involving son-in-law Thomas Locke Beckner

There is a sheriff deed dated May 1849, stating that George Forrest recovered against Thomas L. Beckner & Newbold Cannon "for debt the sum of one hundred & eighty dollars and the further sum of fifty one dollars 20 cents which to the said Forrest were adjudged for his damages by reason of the detention of said debt, together with costs which have had been taxed to the sum of seven dollars 5 cents as costs in that suit expended. For which said debt damages and costs a unit of execution was issued on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of February A.D. 1849 from the office of the Clerk of the circuit Court....commanding him that all of the goods & chattels and real estate of the said Beckner & Cannon be cause to be made the debt damages and costs aforesaid.....and the party of the second part became the purchaser of the East half of the south east quarter of section no. twelve in Township No. sixty two in range no seven west for the sum of ten dollars, and the west half of the south east qr. of section No. twelve in Township No. Sixty two Range No. seven for the sum of ten dollars......and it goes on with more land

Filed for record June 8th, 1849."

The parcels that Thomas had to sell were his original patent lands from 1837.

I assume this is what Newbold is referring to in his will filed in 1850, where is says that he leaves a slave girl to his daughter Malinda only if the debts her husband Thomas owes the estate are paid first. Indeed, this may be the reason Newbold wrote a new will, and changed his executors.


