LETTER DATED MAY 1 1893 TO FELIX A. HAWKINS FROM SISTER UNICY A. BAYNE.

Do you remember about ¹⁸⁰³ 30 years ago the Kentucky Hawkins wrote to M. C. Hawkins about a fortune in England due us. He laughed at it. The war came on and no more was said about it. Now comes the question to me, what was our great grandfathers first name and who did he marry? When did he die, when did he come to America, where did he live before moving to Kentucky. What part of England did he come from? Do you remember Pa saying? Was it his grandmother or great grandmother lived with them in Kentucky?

Where does the Matson come in? Of course a Matson must have married one of grandpa's sisters for the Captian Matson was here in the Blackhawk War was Pa's own cousin. Pa went as a guide to the Company because it was full and he could get no other position.

A lawyer in Illinois is enquiring. Wants to know as far back as we know. Didn't Pa say his great-grandmother was a Matson, a Scotch woman and was torn by a panther, only saved by a little dog. I think in Pa's old Bible in the back part was a record that old Wheat copied from. Had our great grandfathers name and who he married. What was it?

When Pa bought the Bible he gave the old one to Lounda or Camillus. She may have kept it. In that case Bywater got it. (Edward G. Bywater) Moberly, Missouri) Don't you remember he wrote my name Unisa while we spell Unicy. He did not copy our great grandfathers name said that was sufficient. When U C made a copy in the large Bible he just wrote what Wheat did.

H. C. Hawkins of Hannibal, Mo. is forwarding me the news as he gets it from other parties. I shall write to Elizabeth How at Pleasant Hill Mo. I suppose she was a Hawkins, and to the lawyer at Julesburg, Illinois just to ask questions. I would like to know how they found out there was a fortune before I bother much about it. Do try to recollect and write to me as fully as you can and soon.

LETTER DATED DECEMBER 10, 1893 TO F. A. HAWKINS FROM U. A. BAYNES

As to the business spoke of, I had a great deal of news concerning the family. I told you of Mrs. How or Hon. Isaac Hawkins daughter. She gave me the address of Samuel Hawkins of Bath County Kentucky. I told him to go to the old burying ground and see what he could find. He wrote back that our great grandfather was born May 11, 1733 and died October 1805. Our Elizabeth Hawkins was born April 21, 1739 and died October 18, 1805. Our father's Uncle John left six sons. All are married and had families but was ignorant of the eldest son being sole heir. Our father told me the heir moved to Hendrix County, Indiana. The lawyer wrote me his wife's sickness and death had nearly broken him up. He was going to California to stay with a daughter. Has done nothing but write back to send advertisements of the estate and I don't think he had. I can't find one that is willing to put a dollar in it, but I am going to write to an agency in England and see if the estate has ever been claimed at my own expense. That will settle the matter. If we had only had sense enough to have kept our own records I would not be so annoyed.

At her home in Canton, Sunday, Dec. 28th, of Bright's disease, Mrs. Unicy A. Bayne.

Mrs. Bayne was the daughter of Judge Gregory and Mrs. Sarah Hawkins, was born in Bath county, Ky., June 16th, 1822, and came with her parents to Missouri in 1830. She was married to John H. Bayne in 1838, to which union three children, one son and two daughters were born. The husband and son died years ago. She leaves to mourn the loss of a mother's love, two daughters, Mrs. John Shanks and Miss Sara Bayne, as well as a brother, M. H. Hawkins, and a sister, Mrs. Irene Long. She united with the Christian church in 1859, and ever after determinedly showed to the world her allegiance to the gentle Nazarene. Having lived in Canton for many years she had an extensive acquaintance and especially with the older settlers and when in health related many interesting incidents of the early pioneer. Her funeral took place Tuesday and the remains were interred beside other members of her family in the cemetery at Wyaconda Baptist church.

THE CANNONS

Newbold Cannon, father of Sarah Cannon Hawkins, was born in Virginia mar. 18, 1767; died Jan. 8, 1850. Unicy Bounds Cannon, her mother, was born in Virginia Feb. 4, 1766; died Sept. 25, 1831. They and their family migrated to Missouri.

The Cannons were Baptists and my great-grandfather, Newbold Cannon, gave a tract of land for a church site and a cemetery on the Wyaconda, near Canton.

He, his wife, my grandfather and grandmother Hawkins, my own father, mother, brother, infant sister and most of my older relative are buried there.

As my mother was only 8 years old when her grandmother died she (my mother) did not remember her very well, but she liked her grandfather, who was cordial and hospitable. I think he particularly liked her. According to mother his Bible was very much in evidence; but in accordance with the custom of that time, he kept a decanter of peach brandy on his sideboard. Let me hasten to add that he was duly sober. Drinking has not been one of the sins that our race has inclined to, I am glad to say.

You will notice that my mother was named for her grandmother. My opinion is that whoever named her spelled by ear, as they, she and her grandmother, are the only two people that I have ever heard of who were named Unicy. My guess is that they were named for the Biblical Eunice, commended in Acts and Timothy, pronounced according to the classical rule.

Hawkins

John Hawkins was born in London, England, March 22, 1640 and came to America in 1652 with his parents and brothers, Thomas and William. He lived on the James River in Virginia until he was 21. At the age 21 he married Elizabeth Farmer (born in Bristol, England, Sept. 15, 1643) who had come with her parents to America in 1636.

The names John, Thomas, and Gregory Farmer occur most frequently in the subsequent family records. They were all patriots and were staunch adherents of the Episcopal Church.

My great grandfather, Thomas Hawkins, was born Jan. 20, 1760. He married Mary Hargis Steele (widow) and my grandfather, Gregory Farmer Hawkins, their eldest son, was born March 26, 1789 and died Dec. 15, 1859.

He, Gregory Farmer Hawkins, married Sarah Cannon (born Feb. 4, 1795) Jan. 15, 1815. They lived near Greenbrier, Va. but afterwards moved to Bath County Ky., where first 8 children were born, - they had 11 in all (my mother was the 4th).

In 1830 my grandparents and family and their slaves went to Maysville, Ky. and took a boat on the Ohio river. At Cairo, Ill. they re-embarked and ascended the Mississippi as far as Hannibal, Missouri. From there they went by land to Canton on the Mississippi, arriving on the day on which the first town lots were sold.

My grandfather was a farmer and also had a mill. He became a judge, but of what rank I am unable to say. My mother had a great admiration for her father and both were inveterate readers. All my grandparents died before I was born except my grandmother Hawkins, of whom I stood in awe.

My widowed grandmother continued to live at the home place, served by two of the ex-slaves who stayed with her until her death in April 1872.

The Episcopal tradition was broken in my grandfather's time though it was his preference. My grandfathers. My grandmother's father was a very strong Baptist and she could not see her way clear to becoming a member of a church with so much ritual. Finally they compromised on the Methodist Episcopal and were charter members of that faith established in Canton. She was my present age when she died-77. She wore lace caps and, being Rheumatic, walked with a cane. If she could "revisit the glimpses of the moon", I wonder what she would think of the doings of her twentieth century grand daughter.

The Hawkin's in Virginia were pretty numerous and as I have previously said, were patriotic. Capt. Reuben Hawkins was in the Va. Militia, Capt Moses Hawkins was serving in the Revolution in 1777, so also was Samuel Hawkins, and Capt. John Hawkins was in the 3rd Va. Regiment of the Continental Army.

Note: my reading of this is that the cordial grandfather is Newbold Sr. That follows from the comment about "my mother was only 8 years old when her grandmother died." Unicy Bounds Cannon died in 1831, and Unicy Hawkins, her namesake, was born in 1822). I noticed in the Newbold Sr.'s estate sale that Newbold Jr. bought a decanter. Wonder if this is the one mentioned above.

—We learn from the Canton Press that two young men of that city, Eugene A. Murphy and Madison Bayne, started on a hunting excursion on the morning of the 1st inst., and attempted to cross the Mississippi in a light canoe. When about the middle of the river, the stiff breeze and high waves alarmed them and they attempted to return, but in turning, the boat dropped into the trough of the waves and filled. They succeeded in turning the skiff bottom up and clinging to it. After floating a mile or two down the river they were discovered, but just before assistance reached them, young Murphy, exhausted and chilled by the cold, let go his hold and disappeared. Bayne was rescued, though exhausted and nearly helpless. Mr. Murphy was a young man of most excellent character and fine promise.

Inquest on the Body of Eugene Murphy.

—By special request we publish the verdict of the Coroner's inquest upon the body of Eugene A. Murphy, deceased :

State of Missouri, }
County of Lewis. }

We, the undersigned jurors impaneled and sworn on the 8th day of June, 1876, at the township of Union in the county of Lewis and State of Missouri, by A. C. Waltman, a Justice of the Peace, in and for said township of Union, acting as coroner, to diligently inquire and true presentment make how and by whom a certain person whose body was found at a place known as Boat Slough timber in Union township, county and State aforesaid, on the 7th day of June, 1876, came to his death.

Having viewed the body and heard the evidence, do find that his name is Eugene A. Murphy, and the said Murphy was accidentally drowned in the Mississippi river on the 1st day of April, 1876, opposite what is called Smoot's Landing on said river, and was found by Wm. H. Sisler and Walter Turner, at the place where the inquest was held and upon the body was found the following articles :

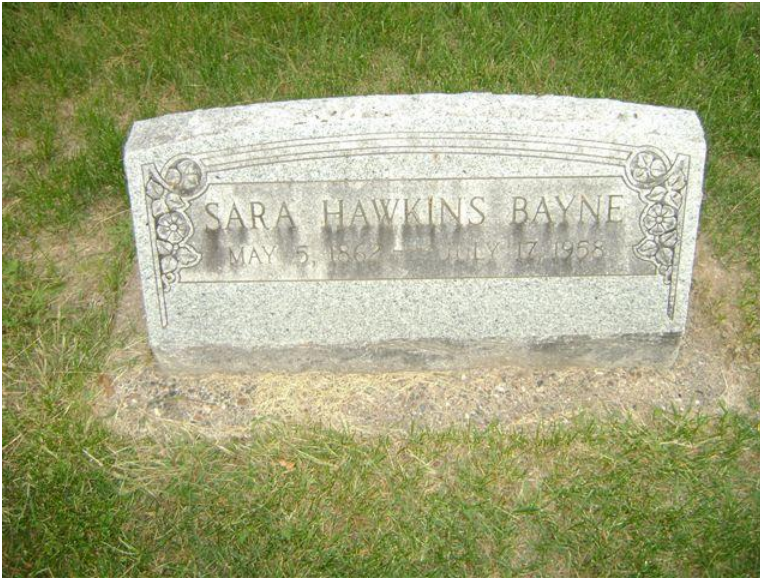

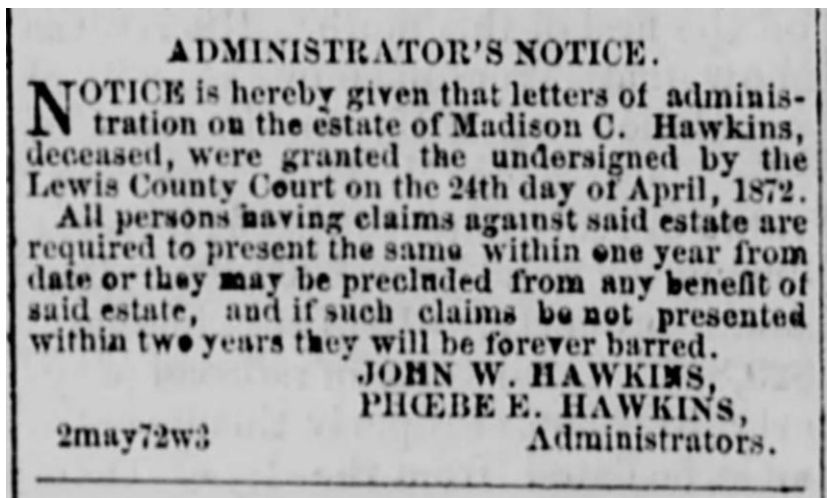

Death of Dr. J. W. Hawkins.

This community was greatly shocked on Tuesday morning to learn of the death of Dr. J. W. Hawkins, who breathed his last on Monday night a few minutes past 10 o'clock. He had been complaining for two or three weeks, having been considerably indisposed on account of the grip and also from a fence post falling on his breast, but no one had considered his ailments serious. Monday evening he did some chores around the house and about 9 o'clock commenced complaining of severe pains in his head and chest. His son, Dr. J. J. Hawkins, gave him all the medical attention in his power and about 10 or 15 minutes before the end came there was hopes for his reviving. But the death angel was hovering over the manly form that we had been so accustomed to see moving in its strength, and before additional medical assistance could be summoned, the soul had taken its flight to the other shore.

Dr. John Wesley Hawkins was born in Platte county, Ky., May 15th, 1828, and removed to Lewis county with his father in 1850. When eighteen he began reading medicine under his brother, M. C. Hawkins and others, and in 1854 graduated from the Am. Med. College of Cincinnati, since which time he was engaged in the successful practice of his profession until his death. During this time for twenty years he occupied the chair of anatomy, physiology and hygiene in Christian University. He was married in 1853 to Mary A. Coryell, who with five daughters and one son survive him. The Dr. has for many years been a consistent member of the Christian church. In Memoriam.

MARY A. HAWKINS.

Mary A. Coryell Hawkins, wife of Dr. John W. Hawkins, died at her home in Canton, Mo., Monday, July 23d, 1894. She was born in Shelby county, Ind. Jan. 25th, 1830. Her parents removed to Cincinnati, Ohio, while she was yet in infancy and remained there until 1846. Her father having died, the widowed mother with six sons and one daughter, the subject of this sketch, came west and located at Tully, in Lewis county, Mo. She united with the Christian church in Sept., 1850, during that memorable meeting held in the old warehouse on the bank of the Mississippi river, at which time about 100 were added to the church.

The meeting was conducted by that gifted and eloquent orator, Bro. S. S. Church, pastor of the church in St. Louis, whose memory will long live in the hearts of his brethren, and the meeting will never be forgotten by the old citizens of Lewis county. In the fall of 1851 Miss Mary A. Coryell matriculated in Christian Female College, Columbia, Mo., as a student. The college was at that time presided over by that chief of female educators, Pres. Jno. Aug. Williams, whose name and memory are deeply engraved on the hearts of many christian women living all over this and other states, whose lives and works are perpetual testimonies to his superior abilities as an educator.

When she left college, she engaged in school teaching for a time. She was married to Dr. John W. Hawkins Sept. 20, 1853, after which they went to Cincinnati, where the doctor attended the Medical college and received his diploma. They then returned to Canton where he practiced his profession successfully for forty years. They were devoted to each other, and with hearts full of love for their fellowman, and with faith in and devotion to their Master's cause they lived, loved and worked together until Jan. 18, 1892, when the Dr. was called to his reward. Mrs. Hawkins had been afflicted with symptoms of heart trouble, and the unexpected death of her husband so prostrated her that life's burdens seemed too great for her grief-stricken heart, and her health gradually declined until on the 23d day of July, 1894, the messenger came and she almost gladly welcomed the summons. She had, like the ivy, clung so confidently to the doctor for support, that in her widowed loneliness, with life's entire purpose wrought, and with faith undiminished, her heart yearned for reunion in that promised land of rest.

Her remains were followed by a long train of carriages, bearing sorrowing relatives and sympathizing friends, and laid to rest beside those of her husband in Forest Grove cemetery. She leaves one son and six daughters to mourn her departure. All are married except Mary Lee, who with Ruth like fidelity, clung to her to the end, and whose dutiful ministrations were remarked by many an admiring friend. Mrs. Sallie Findly has made her home on the breezy plains of Kansas, Mrs. Amy Cameron at Slater, Mo, Mrs. Elizabeth Cason resides in Canton, Mrs. Carrie Perrin at Oklahoma City, Okla, Mrs. Cornelia Preston, Mound City, Mo. The daughters are all graduates of Christian University, and Dr John J Hawkins is a graduate of St Louis College of Physicians and Surgeons and also attended a course at the Physicians' Post Graduate School, New York City, and a successful practitioner in Canton.

The children can be consoled that their parents have gone to their reward with their work well done; and now as they each must go forth to meet life's duties, and bear its burdens, without the advice of father and the tender sympathies of mother, remembering the blessed promise, that when "the father and mother forsake thee, the Lord will take thee up," and having put their trust in Him they can meet at the most-sacred shrine of earth—a mother's grave—and with hearts unburdened in prayer find that consolation which no earthly friends can give.

Sister Hawkins had a genial disposition associated with firmness which rendered her peculiarly adapted to control, presiding over her household with dignity, rearing seven children, commanding implicit obedience, yet retaining their confidence and affections.

Love was the mystic tie that bound them in family union and still holds the hearts of the children harmoniously united. A beautiful monument to her memory! With ready hands and willing heart, she was an earnest worker in the Master's vineyard.

Her sisters sought her counsel in church work, and here again she used her magic wand to control.

She found no labor too irksome, no task too difficult to accomplish the good she sought. Late in life, with sisterly devotion, she responded to the call of an unfortunate brother from the sunny South taking his motherless children to her home and heart. As a friend she was true, as a neighbor kind, as a daughter dutiful, as a sister affectionate, as a mother loving, as a wife faithful and devoted, as a Christian earnest. May those that loved and survive her emulate her virtues and walk worthily in her footsteps, as she walked in the footsteps of her Lord and Savior.

I close this short sketch of her life and character in the beautiful language of one who has long since entered into the spirit land, with the hope that sorrow for the dear ones who have passed away may be useful to us all.

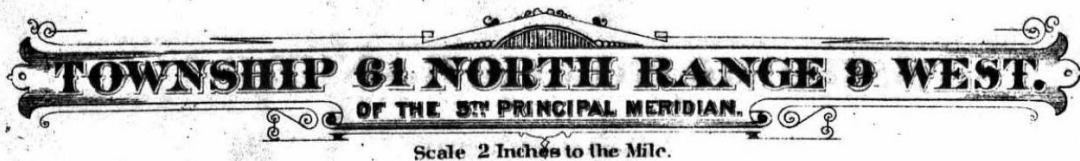

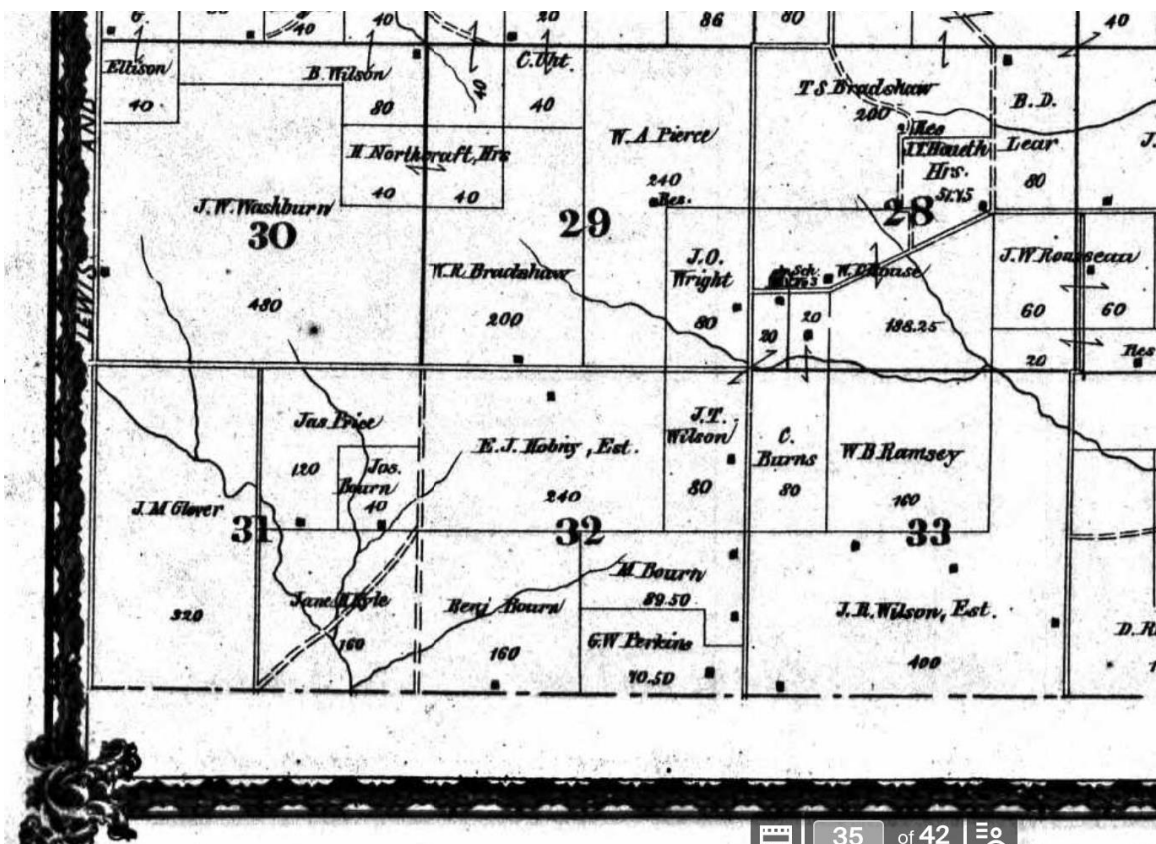



Madison Gregory Hawkins, aged 62 years, departed this life at the farmhouse, 221 West Delaware avenue this Friday morning, September 4, 1925 at 3:15 o'clock. Mr. Hawkins had been in poor health for the past two years, but was up and around most of the time and had made two trips to California for the benefit of his health. Mr. Hawkins was a native of Missouri, having been born in Canton, on the Mississippi river. He was on the street and attending to business as late as last Monday. He came to the Indian Territory when a young man and entered the active life of farmer and rancher. He was a successful handler of live stock, especially cattle. He was also largely interested in the banking business, and for a number of years was a director and vice president of the Vinita National Bank. Thus for many years Mr. Hawkins was a prominent and influential man in the civic and industrial affairs of this community, and there are many in tears today because he has been removed from us.

He was married to Miss Ruth Parks. In addition to his wife he is survived by two daughters and three sons: Mrs. J. C. Skirvin, and Miss Joyce, and Drake, Madison and Thomas Hawkins.

Negro Stabber's Victim Is Dead; Reward Up for Slayer

Jeff Doe, Who Fleed From Train, Owes His Freedom To Hampering Actions of Special Officer Who Delayed Friends of Stricken Traveler

Jeff "Doe" described as "just a mean Nigger" was made the object of a wide spread search yesterday when his alleged victim, Warren Ballinger died of a stab wound and the Pima county supervisors posted a reward of \$100 for the capture and conviction of the youth's assailant.

Young Ballinger, who was stabbed on an east bound freight train

late last Thursday morning as it neared Tucson, died about 9:30 yesterday morning at Southern Methodist hospital. Jeff "Doe," the alleged killer, leaped from the slowly moving train at the Stone avenue crossing, about noon Thursday, and, although pursued by friends of the injured youth, made his escape through the actions of a special officer of the local charities, one Baker, who delayed the pursuers.

Witnesses' Story

The detailed story of the attack upon young Ballinger by an unknown Negro on the freight train; of the arrival here and frustrated attempt to capture the assailant was related yesterday morning in justice court to Judge C. V. Budlong, sitting as a special one-man grand jury. This action, in lieu of coroner's inquest, found that Warren Ballinger, 21, of Sulphur, Oklahoma, died as the result of a stab wound inflicted by an unknown Negro. A careful record of the testimony was kept, as the seven companions of young Ballinger live in various sections of the country and may not all be available in the event of the capture and trial of the Negro "Jeff."

Leaving a wife and baby in California, young Ballinger was beating his way to his Oklahoma home, having heard from his parents that the farm was again in operation and could support the young people. He joined forces in Phoenix with Harry Longacre, Michigan; Albert Dose, Davenport, Iowa; Glen Hofman, Millner, Mo.; Philip Rodgers, Nagadoches, Texas; Howard Harris, Pecos, Texas; and William D. Prewit, Pecos, Texas,

According to these witnesses, the Negro stabbed Ballinger as he was crossing from one car to another about 15 miles west of here. When the freight arrived in Tucson, two friends remained with Ballinger and the other four dismounted at the Stone avenue crossing when the Negro left the cars.

Tried to Aid

One telephoned for the police and an ambulance for the wounded comrade and the others followed the Negro. At this juncture Baker, said

OKLAHOMA'S THOMAS HEADS INFLATIONISTS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16—(AP)—With a southern delegation preparing to move upon Washington, bringing a demand for inflation, more impetus to the drive was brought today by Senator Thomas, the Oklahoma Democrat who has been a persistent advocate of the monetary change.

Thomas, who sent a telegram to all members of congress yesterday asking them to send him their views on inflation for transmission to President Roosevelt, said tonight he had received replies from 56 house and senate members.

He listed 53 of these for inflation, two against and one as non-committal. Those he said had telegraphed opposition were Senator Barbour of New Jersey and Representative Treadway of Massachusetts, both Republicans.

He listed three Republican representatives, Dondero of Michigan, Gilchrist of Iowa and Sinclair of North Dakota, as for inflation. Representative Arens of Minnesota, a Farmer-Laborite, also was placed in the affirmative column.

Among the Democrats to join Thomas, Senator Harrison of Mississippi, chairman of the finance committee, and Senator Fletcher of Florida, chairman of the banking committee, were Senators Neeley of West Virginia, George of Georgia, Erickson of Montana, Caraway of Arkansas, Logan of Kentucky, and Pope of Idaho.

The southern delegations coming to press their demands for inflation and a fixed price of 15 cents a pound for cotton upon President Roosevelt will bring spokesmen from South Carolina, Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia and Oklahoma.

to be an officer of the charities in charge of the rockpile near by, made the youths explain everything to him, insisted that they go with him in his car, entered into an argument with police headquarters about the city's paying for his gasoline, and so delayed matters that the Negro disappeared.

The Negro, the witnesses said walked north on Stone from the tracks to the first west-east street and turned left. Baker, however, insisted on going to the right. Then Baker had to buy some gasoline for his car, the witnesses continued, and entered into a telephone dissertation with the police station seeking that the city pay for it, which took up some more time. After wasting about a half hour, Baker made some slight repairs to his car so that he could "toot the horn" the witness added.

MURDER SUSPECT TO BE SET FREE

Witnesses To Stabbing Fail To Identify Phoenix Man

The search for the slayer of Warren Ballinger, who was fatally knifed last Thursday afternoon, continued today when Sheriff John F. Belton announced that the suspect returned from Phoenix yesterday afternoon was absolved of any connection with the knifing although he was still being held in the county jail.

Sheriff Belton yesterday went to Phoenix to return a Negro suspect arrested the previous night near the railroad tracks. Witnesses to the stabbing of young Ballinger, an Oklahoma resident, on a freight train, said the Negro in custody was not the one they saw plunge a knife into the youth's abdomen, although in some respects he answers the description of the man sought.

He told officers that he lived in Tucson for nine years and that last March he went to Phoenix to seek employment. He came here from West Virginia. His wife died in this city. He said the last visit he made here was on July 3. He said he had no living relatives.

WANTED NEGRO HELD IN L. A. IS REPORT

"Jeff," the otherwise unidentified Negro who stabbed and killed Warren Ballinger, youthful Oklahoma transient on a freight train approaching Tucson a short time ago, may be in custody in Los Angeles, it was reported yesterday. The county attorneys office has been asked to supply the Los Angeles police with the names and addresses of the several companions of Ballinger, witnesses to the stabbing, in the hopes of identifying the Negro held in Los Angeles. This man, according to Clarence Houston, county attorney, is being held in connection with the stabbing of a police officer.

News of the possible arrest of Jeff came to Houston yesterday through Harry Maxey, friends of Ballinger's people in Oklahoma. It was Maxey who requested names of witnesses to the stabbing, and the names and addresses of Warren Ballinger's companions who could identify the Negro were supplied and sent to the Los Angeles authorities.

Her birth year is erroneously 1870 on her grave marker. Her age was 8 in the 1880 Missouri Census, enumerated 17-18 Jun 1880. Her birth was indicated as Sep 1871 in the 1900 Missouri Census, enumerated 14 Jun 1900. Her birthdate is given as 12 Oct 1870 on her death certificate, the informant seemingly an unrelated Mrs. Chas Hagood of La Grange, aka Mary Amanda (Bland) Hagood, that likely had no idea. This birthdate makes no sense for two reasons. First, her parents were married six days later on 18 Oct 1870. Second, she had a sister Nora that died 21 Aug 1872 whose age at death implies a birthdate of 26 Sep 1871. Cora and Nora would be logical names for twin girls, and their mother also had a set of infant twins that died in 1877. As such, it seems clear that Cora was likely a twin of Nora and born on 26 Sep 1871. She married Henry Seldon "Sel" Rightmire on 17 Mar 1897, but by May 1900 she was noted in a news article as Miss Cora Hawkins, and by Jun 1900 both parties were listed as single in the Missouri Census. 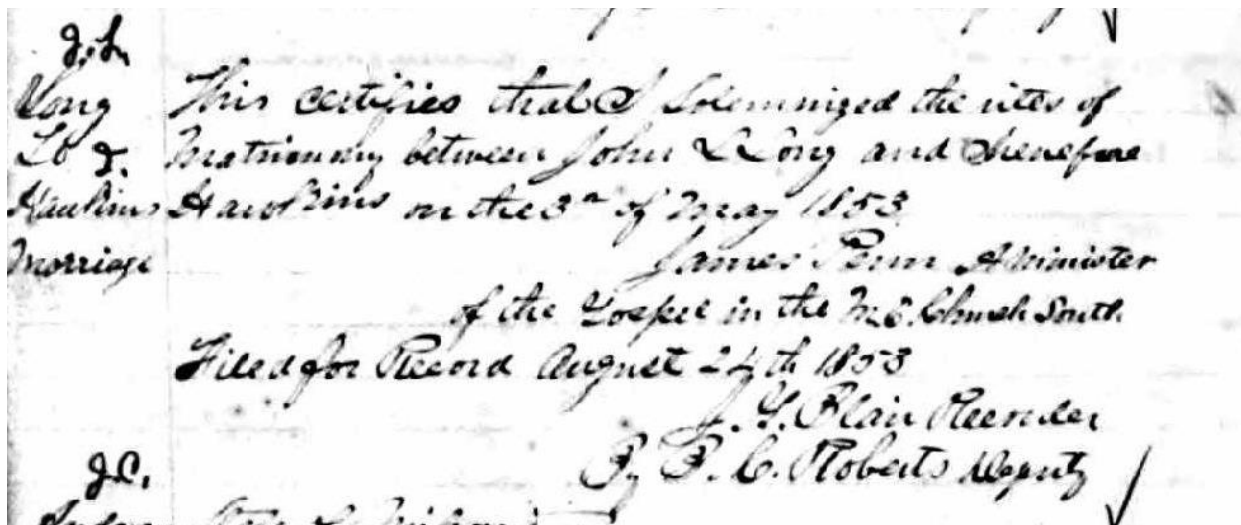

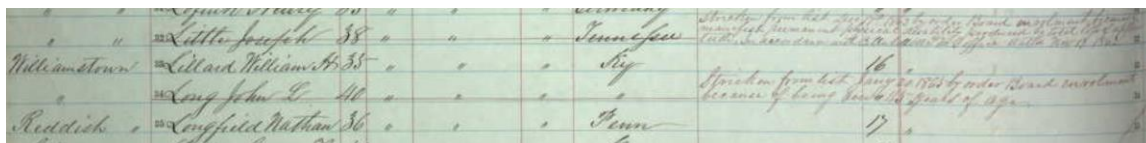

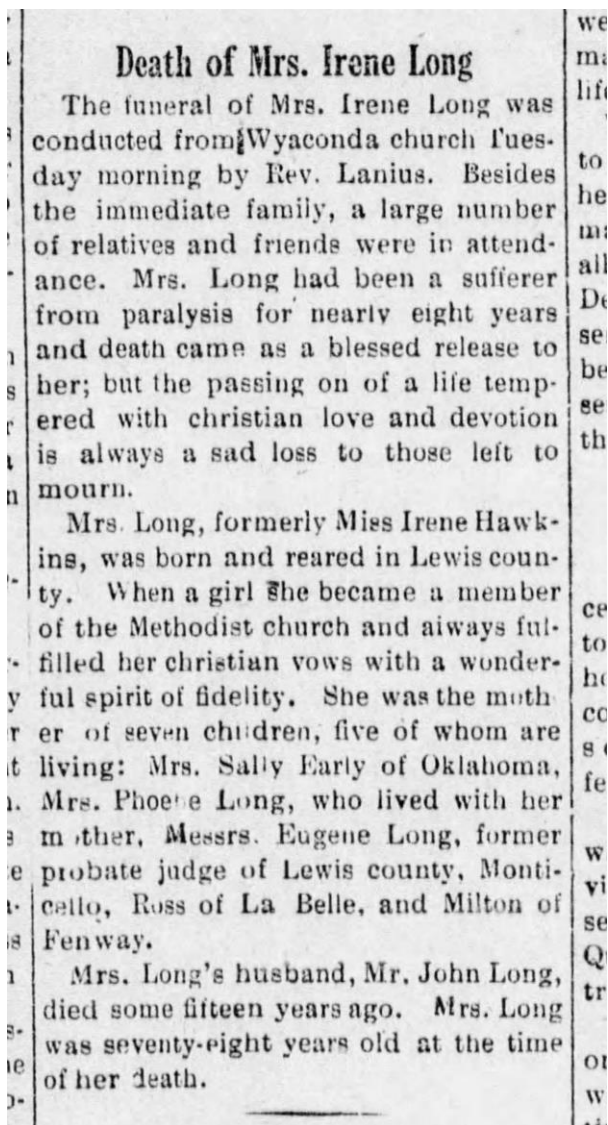

Eugene H. Long was born in Lewis county, Missouri, July 2, 1858, and died on March 21, 1918, at Santa Rosa Hospital in San Antonio, Texas, at the age of 59 years, 8 months and 19 days. Heart and kidney troubles caused his death.

His father was John L. Long. His mother was Irene F. Long. Her maiden name was Hawkins. She was a sister of M. C. and John Hawkins.

Judge Long was well educated in the public schools and at Christian University, Canton, Lewis county, Mo. He read law with that good man, George Ellison, and was admitted to the bar in open court September 20, 1881, and immediately commenced practicing his profession at LaGrange, Lewis county. From LaGrange he went to Colorado and successfully practiced his profession there for several years and returned to Lewis county, Missouri, and owning a fine tract of land near Deer Ridge, Mo., took up farming and was a model farmer.

In 1898 he was elected judge of the probate court for Lewis county. He was re-elected three times by the people and filled the office with distinction and credit for four continuous terms—sixteen years—longer than any person ever before served in this office in Lewis county. Had he desired to serve longer, the people of Lewis county would have kept him in it, because he had so well performed the responsible duties thereof. He was a model and just judge.

He was a true christian and a devout member of the Methodist church, South. Was an honored and respected member of the following fraternal orders: A. F. & A. m.; M. W. of A.; Brotherhood of American Yoemen, and Independent Order of Odd Fellows.

In recent years Judge Long's health began to fail and he went to Texas in November, 1917, where he owned a large tract of land, hoping to regain his health. His faithful and estimable wife and helpmate accompanied him. For awhile he grew stronger, yet later he grew worse and a short time before his death he was taken to Santa Rosa Hospital at San Antonio, where everything was done for him that science and the tender care of his loving wife could do, but the Grim Reaper had called him and he died March 21, 1918. His body reached Canton Saturday evening, March 23, 1918, and was taken to the home of his cousin, Mrs. E. N. Cason, where it remained until Saturday afternoon, March 24, until 2:30 o'clock, when his Masonic brethren took charge of his mortal remains, accompanied by the sorrowful relatives and friends, and tenderly bore it to the Wyaconda church for services there conducted by Bro. Harvey of the M. E. church, South, after which he was buried in the graveyard there under and according to the beautiful and solemn rites and ceremonies of that great and good Masonic order.

Eugene H. Long was a good man. He lived a useful life and by goodness made everyone he met his friend. More than one thousand attended this funeral, all sorrowful because of his death.
