

Four persons are in the Bothwell hospital injured and another escaped injury when a Ford roadsfer driven by Ollie Richwine, turned over and rolled down a twelve foot embankment on north Highway 65 on the curve between Missouri avenue and Osage avenue, about 10 o'clock Saturday night.

Young Sedalian On Lexington From Flaming Ship To Rescue Destroyer

Willard Wilson Chewning Smiles--Sorry He Was Not In Midway Battle



Granted leave he arrives home to visit relatives but even after harrowing experience is ready and willing to return to active duty, and would like to be on new Lexington.

"There was a big blaze of fire and then she disappeared," Willard Wilson Chewing, 20, of Sedalia, related Saturday in describing the hero's death of his ship, the U. S. aircraft carrier Lexington, which went to its grave with colors flying after the great Coral Sea battle of May 8.

Chewning, seaman second class, is a son of Mrs. Mattie Chewning, 1706 East Fourth street. He enlisted in the navy the day after the Japanese sneak attack on Pearl Harbor and took his oath in St. Louis December 16. From then on life has been full of excitement, and his only injuries have been two smashed fingers. However, three of his best friends, were killed in action in the spectacular naval episode of the Coral Sea, in which the U. S. scored an impressive victory.

One of Williard Chewning's regrets is that he didn't get in on the battle at Midway

Internal Explosions

His last view of the Lexington was about 7:40 o'clock the evening of May 8 as he stood on the deck of a destroyer 20 miles away. When all hands were ordered off the aircraft carrier as internal explosions shook her, Chewning slid down a ladder onto the destroyer which had pulled alongside. But before he went off, he

attached a string to his beloved album of the Lexington and threw it onto the destroyer's deck. That and a pipe were all that he saved

of his possessions.

"I didn't want to leave her," he said, "but we had to when we couldn't control the fires." The Lexington finally was sunk by American torpedoes to prevent her from falling into the hands of the Japs in case she stayed afloat, but for hours the big aircraft carrier, her complement was about 2,800—refused to go down, although she had suffered mortal blows by enemy torpedoes and bombs

The attack on the Lexington came about 11:30 in the morning during the Coral Sea battle, with 55 or 60 Jap planes in the attacking force.

Standing By Gun

The Sedalia sailor, serving as second gunner, was standing by his anti-aircraft gun when he saw the first Jap aircraft coming in. It was a torpedo plane and was flying 20 or 30 feet above the water, Chewning recalled. The Americans let go with their fire.

Downed 19 Jap Planes

"We got 19 Jap planes," he proudly explained. His own gun group accounted for two—a dive bomber and a torpedo plane. He saw two enemy ships crash—the heat of the battle was so furious it was hard to tell who had scored the hits—one of them piling up in a flaming heap on the deck of the Lexington.

Chewning reported that the enemy used three types of craft—torpedo planes, Zeros and dive bombers. As the Japanese airmen assaulted the Lexington, planes from the U. S. carrier were blasting at the enemy, inflicting a toll of two Jap aircraft carriers.

Even several hours after the battle the Lexington was on even keel and was doing 22 knots, when the explosions caused by damage in the fight occurred the men were still at their battle stations. Then came the orders to abandon ship, and the officers and sailors were rescued by U. S. warships hovering by. Navy communiques have estimated that 92 per cent of the men of the

Lexington were saved.

The Coral Sea battle was not the first for the young Sedalian. He was in a big melee in February and in March there was the

sea fight at the Samoa Isles off

New Guinea.

After only a month's training at San Diego, following his enlistment in December, Chewning was sent to Pearl Harbor and later was assigned to the Lexington.

Injured After Battle

His injuries—well, several days after the Coral Sea scrap he was carrying a five-inch projectile, lost his footing and it fell on his left hand, smashing a couple of fingers. He's glad the projectile didn't explode.

Chewning, a slight, alert fellow with brown eyes and brown hair that pops out from under his sailor's cap, landed on the west coast early in June and arrived in Sedalia Thursday on a 12-day furlough.

He hitch-hiked home. "Oh, you came by the thumb route?" he was asked during an interview Saturday. "No, the air route—'air ya going my way?" he quip-

ped.

It took him four days to make it here from California, and en route he encountered a number of fellow mates from the Lexington, all anxious to get to their homes after the exciting forays

Chewning is visiting in Sedalia with his mother, his sister, Mrs. Mina Brown, a brother Wheeler Chewning, all of the home address, and another sister Miss Nona Chewning who is here from Grain Valley, Mo.

Brother In Army

The young seaman has a brother, Harry Chewning, serving with the U S. army at Sitka, Alaska. There are two other brothers and two sisters away from home. Willard was born July 6, 1921 at LaMonte. His father was the late C. L. Chewning.

Asked if he has a sweetheart, he said "Sure I do." She works in a Sedalia drug store, and would be pleased to see the way he smiled when he spoke of her.

But that's the way Willard Chewning came up from his harrowing experience at sea—smiling. He's ready to go back to duty, as soon as he gets his visiting done at home—and he would like very much to be assigned to the new Lexington.

The Painters bought a bungalow at 9420 Eberhardt av., the suit states, for \$9,750, or \$4,000 more than it was worth, and moved in last June. The Crneks rented the apartment to friends, the suit states, and moved into the other half of the duplex.

The Painters ask that the Crneks be compelled to pay the \$4,000 as well as \$1,000 of moving costs.

Deny Shielding Report

Controversy on Tavern Bares Dec. 3 Slugging

Controversy over a maneuver by which the Chicago Heights city council extended the municipality's "wet" territory to permit operation of a tavern on Western avenue resulted in circulation of a report — since substantiated that a city policeman was slugged in a saloon last December 3.

Andrew Foley, commissioner of public health and safety, and Chief of Police Philip Howard denied that a police report of the slugging had been suppressed at the time. Nevertheless, the incident was treated to an uncommon "thunder of silence" for an offense of its type.

No action was taken against the tavern, despite the fact that the operators had been warned previously that "one more disturbance" would result in revocation of the license. The matter was not brought before the city council at an open meeting.

Pays \$25 Fine

The policeman's assailant, a Park Forest man, escaped with a disorderly conduct fine of \$25 and costs.

According to the police report. Policeman Joseph Ciancanelli was slugged by Eldon E. Painter, 3225 Western avenue, at Seggebruch's tavern, 1722 Halsted street, Chicago Heights.

Answering a call reporting a disturbance was being created in the tavern, Ciancanelli was allegedly floored by a haymaker swung by Painter as soon as the policeman opened the door and stepped inside.

Injuries suffered by Clancanelli subsequently caused him to have a number of teeth removed by a dentist.

Foley and Howard maintain that the report of the incident was filed properly and no attempt was made to withhold full information from the public.

which would normally have been available the day after the slugging, Howard said, "I don't think it was suppressed."

Foley added, "I know of no reason why the report might have been suppressed"

Defends Tavern Owner

The commissioner also took the position that unless the tavern owner is directly involved in a disturbance, the tavern is absolved from blame.

"It wasn't the tavern owner," I Foley declared in explaining why no disciplinary measures were taken. "The fellow started raising a disturbance. The tavern owner called the police. That is what he is supposed to do."

A hearing on the disorderly conduct charge filed by Ciancanelli against Painter was shifted from Police Magistrate Robert A. Meier III to Justice of the Peace David Shapiro. A change of venue was granted at the request of the defendant.

In addition to the fine, Foley said he "understood" Ciancanelli was reimbursed by Painter for medical treatment.

Both the Gillespie and McLaughlin ambulances answered calls and rushed the injured to the hospital where medical attention was rendered by Dr. Snavely, city physician.

According to the Calvin boy, Richwine was driving at a fairly fast rate of speed when he rounded a curve, the car started to swerve and the driver evidently lost control of the automobile and it turned turtle.

Harry Chewning, 1700 East Fourth, had some uneasy moments about 9:40 a.m. Friday while digging a ditch in the alley between Lamine and Massachusetts, Fifth and Sixth, when one wall caved in on him.

Chewning felt dirt trickling on his back and before he could get out a portion of the wall caved in and trapped him for several minutes. Percy Wells, 408 East Second, a helper began digging dirt away from him and freed Chewning.

Bill Wear, 715 North Quincy, who is supervising the work, arrived within a few minutes and also helped to dig Chewning loose from his trap.

Chewning after his experience reported he was not hurt but at one time felt sure his legs were going to be broken.





Willard Wilson Chewning Smiles--Sorry He Was Not In Midway Battle



Granted leave he arrives home to visit relatives but even after harrowing experience is ready and willing to return to active duty, and would like to be on new Lexington.

"There was a big blaze of fire and then she disappeared," Willard Wilson Chewing, 20, of Sedalia, related Saturday in describing the hero's death of his ship, the U. S. aircraft carrier Lexington, which went to its grave with colors flying after the great Coral Sea battle of May 8.

Chewning, seaman second class, is a son of Mrs. Mattie Chewning, 1706 East Fourth street. He enlisted in the navy the day after the Japanese sneak attack on Pearl Harbor and took his oath in St. Louis December 16. From then on life has been full of excitement, and his only injuries have been two smashed fingers. However, three of his best friends, were killed in action in the spectacular naval episode of the Coral Sea, in which the U. S. scored an impressive victory.

One of Williard Chewning's regrets is that he didn't get in on the battle at Midway

Internal Explosions

His last view of the Lexington was about 7:40 o'clock the evening of May 8 as he stood on the deck of a destroyer 20 miles away. When all hands were ordered off the aircraft carrier as internal explosions shook her, Chewning slid down a ladder onto the destroyer which had pulled alongside. But before he went off, he

attached a string to his beloved album of the Lexington and threw it onto the destroyer's deck. That and a pipe were all that he saved of his possessions.

"I didn't want to leave her," she said, "but we had to when we couldn't control the fires." The Lexington finally was sunk by American torpedoes to prevent her from falling into the hands of the Japs in case she stayed afloat, but for hours the big aircraft carrier, her complement was about 2,800—refused to go down, although she had suffered mortal blows by enemy torpedoes and bombs

The attack on the Lexington came about 11:30 in the morning during the Coral Sea battle, with 55 or 60 Jap planes in the attacking force.

Standing By Gun

The Sedalia sailor, serving as second gunner, was standing by his anti-aircraft gun when he saw the first Jap aircraft coming in. It was a torpedo plane and was flying 20 or 30 feet above the water, Chewning recalled. The Americans let go with their fire.

Downed 19 Jap Planes

"We got 19 Jap planes," he proudly explained. His own gun group accounted for two—a dive bomber and a torpedo plane. He saw two enemy ships crash—the heat of the battle was so furious it was hard to tell who had scored the hits—one of them piling up in a flaming heap on the deck of the Lexington.

Chewning reported that the enemy used three types of craft—torpedo planes, Zeros and dive bombers. As the Japanese airmen assaulted the Lexington, planes from the U. S. carrier were blasting at the enemy, inflicting a toll of two Jap aircraft carriers.

Afloat Several Hours

Even several hours after the

Even several hours after the battle the Lexington was on even keel and was doing 22 knots, when the explosions caused by damage in the fight occurred the men were still at their battle stations. Then came the orders to abandon ship, and the officers and sailors were rescued by U. S. warships hovering by. Navy communiques have estimated that 92 per cent of the men of the Lexington were saved.

The Coral Sea battle was not the first for the young Sedalian. He was in a big melee in February and in March there was the sea fight at the Samoa Isles off New Guinea.

After only a month's training at San Diego, following his enlistment in December, Chewning was sent to Pearl Harbor and later was assigned to the Lexington.

Injured After Battle

His injuries—well, several days after the Coral Sea scrap he was carrying a five-inch projectile, lost his footing and it fell on his left hand, smashing a couple of fingers. He's glad the projectile didn't explode.

Chewning, a slight, alert fellow with brown ever and brown hair

Chewning, a slight, alert fellow with brown eyes and brown hair that pops out from under his sailor's cap, landed on the west coast

early in June and arrived in Sedalia Thursday on a 12-day furlough.

He hitch-hiked home. "Oh, you came by the thumb route?" he was asked during an interview Saturday. "No, the air route-'air ya going my way?" he quip-

It took him four days to make it here from California, and en route he encountered a number of fellow mates from the Lexington, all anxious to get to their homes after the exciting forays at sea.

Chewning is visiting in Sedalia with his mother, his sister, Mrs. Mina Brown, a brother Wheeler Chewning, all of the home address, and another sister Miss Nona Chewning who is here from Grain Valley, Mo.

Brother In Army

The young seaman has a brother, Harry Chewning, serving with the U S. army at Sitka, Alaska. There are two other brothers and two sisters away from home. Willard was born July 6, 1921 at LaMonte. His father was the late C. L. Chewning.

Asked if he has a sweetheart, he said "Sure I do." She works in a Sedalia drug store, and would be pleased to see the way he smiled when he spoke of her.

But that's the way Willard Chewning came up from his harrowing experience at sea-smiling. He's ready to go back to duty, as soon as he gets his visiting done at home-and he would like very much to be assigned to the new Lexington.

Their son is now in Bremerton, Wash., waiting to be assigned to a ship.

Willard Wilson Chewning, TheSedaliaDemocrat, 9.14.1942

The following story was given to me by Nita Chewning:

World War II, Willard W. Chewning August 06, 2007 12:49 PM By Williard W. Chewning Sedalia

On Dec. 7, 1941, I was at the Uptown Theater when a news flash came across the movie screen. Pearl Harbor had been attacked by the Japanese. My thoughts were, who was Pearl Harbor and why would they want to hurt a woman? I soon found out.

On Dec. 8, 1941, at the age of 20, with Mom's permission, I enlisted in the Navy. On Dec. 16, a group of young men boarded the train for St. Louis, where we were inducted and took the Navy oath. I went through boot camp with three other boys who left Sedalia with me. I served with Amos Karr, John Stansbury Jr., who was killed aboard the USS Enterprise, and Floyd Hall, who became a Navy pilot. He was shot down over the island of Chi Chi Jima. He was captured by the Japanese and eventually beheaded, as described in the book "Flyboys."

At my last evening meal at the San Diego naval station, I spotted Freeman Paxton, of Sedalia, who enlisted a week after I did.

My company, 41-195, went aboard the USS Crescent City and arrived at Pearl Harbor eight days later. At Pearl Harbor, I wound up on working parties. We removed ammunition through the side of the battleship Utah, which was on her side in the mud after the Japanese blasted her.

On Jan. 30, 1942, I was assigned to the USS Lexington CV-2 to the 7th Division. The next day we left Pearl Harbor for the first war patrol. On Feb. 20, we were attacked by Japanese planes. Lt. Cmdr. Butch O'Hare, the first Navy ace, shot down five of the planes. He was awarded the Medal of Honor.

Also O'Hare Airport in Chicago was named in his honor. Lt. Cmdr. O'Hare was killed in an air battle in 1943.

We took the Lexington back to Pearl Harbor in April 1942 to get new guns and planes. We went back to sea in May 1942. Japanese planes flew over our ship just about dark. Some of our ships opened fire, but didn't hit anything. The Japanese fleet was reported to be 30 miles from us.

On May 8, 1942, while our planes were attacking the Japanese, they, in turn, were getting in their licks on us. Our ship was severely damaged. There were several explosions through out the ship, due to gasoline warheads exploding. Finally, the order was given to abandon ship.

The USS Morris DD-417 was along our starboard side. After the wounded were taken off, I retrieved my prized Lexington log album. I then went down the monkey line to the deck of the USS Morris DD-417. The next day we went to general quarters. Bogies, unidentified objects, had been picked up by radar. I was volunteered to carry five-inch projectiles to the guns.

The ship made a violent turn and I was thrown off my feet. My left hand was severely damaged. I was taken to sick bay and placed in a bunk that belonged to Oscar Lee Boyer, of Sedalia. I met Oscar on the day he enlisted in the Navy, in November 1941.

We went to Tongatabu in the Tonga Islands, escorted by the USS Chester, and boarded the USS Barnett. We arrived in the United States 14 days later. After a short furlough, we were transferred to Bremerton, Wash., naval yards.

In July 1942, I was on several working parties chipping paint in the bilges of battleships brought in from Pearl Harbor for repairs.

One day we were lined up along the roadway while a motorcade passed. In one of the cars, I spotted President Franklin Delano Roosevelt. My shipmates told me I was seeing things. The next day we learned it had indeed been our president.

While we waited for a new ship, I met Red Sullivan, whom I had known in Sedalia. I also visited the Army hospital at Fort Lewis, Wash., to visit my older brother, Harry, who had returned from Dutch Harbor, Alaska. All of my brothers, except for one, served in World War II.

On Nov. 8, 1942, we commissioned the USS Card CVE-11, nicknamed the Lucky Card. After the shakedown cruise and qualifying pilots for carrier landings, we headed for the Panama Canal. I went ashore in Cologne, Panama.

Then we went to Norfolk, Va., for supplies and on to the Navy yard in Brooklyn, N.Y.

We then escorted a convoy of ships to the Mediterranean Sea. At the time, it was the largest convey ever assembled - 129 ships over 70 square miles.

Our planes provided submarine patrol, as well as our three old four-stacker destroyers that were our escort. This was Task Force 21.14. This convoy never lost a ship. It went through the Strait of Gibraltar and to Casablanca. After this first convoy, we operated as a hunter-killer task force to sink German submarines.

At night on Oct. 30, 1943, one of our escort destroyers, the USS Borie, rammed a German U-boat. Hand-to-hand combat ensued with guns, knives and whatever was available. The U-boat sank. The Borie was heavily damaged and had to be abandoned the following evening.

The next morning, she was still afloat. We found 30 of the crew afloat in their life jackets in frigid seas with 15- to 20-foot waves. We could not stop to pick them up for fear of the U-boats lurking about. I believe it was in July 1943 that we were awarded the Presidential Unit Citation. This was the first baby flat-top to earn this award.

On Dec. 24, near the Bay of Biscayne, we were spotted by a German four-motor plane. It shadowed us all day long. We could not launch planes because the seas were too rough. That night found us in the midst of a U-boat wolf pack on the surface. The destroyer USS Shenk was ordered to attack the U-boats. She was damaged, so the USS Leary was sent back to help. She was promptly sunk by the U-boats.

Come daylight, we could see the submarines on the surface trying to catch up to us. Needless to say, no time was wasted trying to get out of there. Our task group was ultimately credited with sinking 11

U-boats.

In 1943, we were tied up to a pier in the Brooklyn Navy yard across from a battleship. I received a letter from home that told me my younger brother, Wheeler Chewning, was serving on the USS Iowa, the ship next to ours. They would not let me come aboard because she had not been commissioned. My brother knew that I was aboard the USS Card and came looking for me. I had gone on liberty. The next day, I found him in the chow line aboard the USS Iowa. We bumped into each other twice more during the war. Wheeler was only 16 when he joined the Navy.

In 1943, my ship ended up in the middle of a hurricane. For three days, green water came over the bow of the ship. Our propeller was out of the water as much as it was under.

On the night it reached its peak, I was helmsman on the wheel watch. I was using left full rudder and the ship was going in the other direction. I was finally able to bring her back on course. I sure thought we were going to founder.

In April 1944, I and four other sailors were transferred to the naval air technical training center in Norman, Okla. At Norman, I was a brig guard, a petty officer of the guards and finally made boatswain mate, second class. I was in charge of four ship services, master-at-arms force, and oversaw 33 men.

I was discharged at Lambert Field in St. Louis on Nov. 24, 1945. This ended the greatest adventure of my life.

Controversy: on Tavern Bares Dec. 3 Slugging

Controversy over a maneuver by which the Chicago Heights city council extended the municipality's "wet" territory to permit operation of a tavern on Western avenue resulted in circulation of a report - since substantiated that a city policeman was slugged in a saloon last December 3.

Andrew Foley, commissioner of public health and safety, and Chief of Police Philip Howard denied that a police report of the slugging had been suppressed at the time. Nevertheless, the incident was treated to an uncommon "thunder of silence" for an offense of its type.

No action was taken against the tavern, despite the fact that the operators had been warned previously that "one more disturbance" would result in revocation of the license. The matter was not brought before the city council at an open meeting.

Pays \$25 Fine

The policeman's assailant, a Park Forest man, escaped with a disorderly conduct fine of \$25 and costs.

According to the police report. Policeman Joseph Ciancanelli was slugged by Eldon E. Painter. 3225 Western avenue, at Seggebruch's tavern, 1722 Halsted street. Chicago Heights.

Answering a call reporting a disturbance was being created in the tavern, Ciancanelli was allegedly floored by a haymaker swung by Painter as soon as the policeman opened the door and stepped inside.

Injuries suffered by Clancanelli subsequently caused him to have a number of teeth removed by a dentist.

Foley and Howard maintain that the report of the incident

was filed properly and no attempt was made to withhold full information from the public.
