


In 2008, I was corresponding with a cousin, Nita Jacobson Chewning, wife of Allen Chewning, who was son of Austin Raymond 'Bill' Chewning. Uncle Bill was my grandmother's brother (Letha Florence Chewning Downes). They were great grandchildren of Granville Washington and Mary Ann Hanvey Chewning.

Nita gave me great amounts of information. This is from an email she sent me in 2008:

Mary Frances grew up on a farm in Clark County, Missouri. At age 23 was married to William Noe. They stayed in Clark County for a time, but soon moved to another county. The letter written by her sister Elizabeth (Bettie). Expressed the hope that they would move back to Union Twp. where the other family members lived, rather than to go to Oregon.

In the letter Elizabeth hoped that Mary Frances and Will would send a likeness of son Johnny to them. Johnny had been born in 1863 in Lafayette, Missouri. The next child, David Sampson, was born in Lyon County, Nevada in Aug. 1866. Probably the trip west was commenced early in 1866, but rumors of the move must have circulated among family members for several years.

Mary Frances was a very strong woman and a person of great courage. To undergo the hardships of traveling in a covered wagon from Missouri to California demonstrates qualities of bravery and fortitude.

After reaching California they went to Monterey and from there to Oregon.

Mary Frances loved to smoke a pipe it seems as many of the Chewning women did.

Mary Frances stayed in contact with the Missouri Chewnings for a great number of years. It is not known whether or not there was any communication with brother John's son Marion Francis and his family who moved to Oregon in 1900.

Ruth gave me so very much information that could be picked up and worked with. She gave memories of MMJ and her children and the hard times that were had by all of the family.

Information from Bob Ladd on March 4 2000 states that Mary Frances was at Santa Cruz County, CA, in 1874 and died at Gold Hill, OR, on March 24, 1928.

Mary F. died at the home of her daughter Mrs. F.M. Armstrong (Julia Noe Armstrong) where she had lived for the last seven years of her life.

Julia, Mary's daughter, had also put that Mary F. birth date was Aug. 27th, 1840 and was 87 years 5 months and 7 days old when she died. There has been found notes written by William P. Noe that she was born in 1839. These notes are in the possession of Bob Ladd.

It is hard to try and figure out who was right in such a case. both were so very close to Mary F. So who would be right. I would have to say that the information on the death cert would be the legal records. Although it may be different then family notes.

Family records show Mary Frances was born 8/24/1839, Neeper, Clark, MO, and died 3/24/1928, in Yamhill County, OR.

Her death cert says she died in Dundee, Yamhill, OR.

Martha Noe, William's sister, was married in Carson City, Nevada, in 1866.


Apparently the family emigrated to Nevada by 1866, the birth of son David. **Nita's information says that David was born in Lyon County, Nevada 8/1866.** In this email from Nita, there was a letter from Mary's sister Elizabeth (Bettie/Betsy) Chewning asking Mary to send a likeness of their son Johnny back to Union twp. Johnny had been born in Missouri in 1863. This email goes on to say that Mary Frances was a very strong woman, and of great personal courage. They traveled in a covered wagon from Missouri to California, demonstrating bravery and fortitude.

5/2017: I don't have the email to which I refer above, but I wrote this years ago concerning communication from Nita. I am particularly curious that I wrote years ago that Nita referred to their son as *David Sampson*. I had forgotten this, but find that interesting in light of the fact that I cannot find out what was the name of their second son – was is Leland S? Leland Sampson? David L? David Sampson? Louis Sampson????

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





Letter from sister-in-law Caroline Bergman Chewning

Nita provided us a letter sent to Mary, written by Caroline Chewning (wife of Mary's brother Stephen Chewning). It was written after Stephen's death, and is very heart-wrenching.

Antiock Mo May 3/85

Dear Sister,

I take the oppertunity to drop you a few lines to let you know that I am not in the best of health at the present I have had bad luck in the last year in the first place Billy & Rosa took the Sore eyes and each one of them lost one eye and that was not troble enough so I had to part with Stephen as he died on the 20^{th} of April you do not know the trouble that I have to bear and it all come on at once so I did not know what to do as I seem lost all the time we have not doen very much farming as yet as I was put back So By Steven dieing and the weather is so cold & wet and backward that the sead would not grow if it was planted I have not made any garden yet but I am going to commence next week and I hope that you may never have the troble that I have and you must not think hard of me for not writing to you any sooner times is dull at the present but if the weather stayes nice times will begin to look up again this is the 3 of May and is as cold as in the first of April Mose was even here to day and he is doing well at the present my children is growing up fast just likes weeds Martha fields is dead also I would like to see you all once more but I may never see you again so I will bring my short letters to a close by saying write soon from Caroline Chewning







Lulu's school merits in Gonzales, 1889

I have no idea when the family moved to Gonzales, or if maybe the kids moved to attend school, and William and Mary Frances didn't? Don't know, but Lulu received school merits in Gonzales in 1889, and had entries written by her siblings in her signature book from 1891 – 1893, with Gonzales written as their address or location.

This timeframe corresponds with Louis Sampson Know – if that is Leland – being listed as a voter in Gonzales in 1888.

The merit certificates were given from April – May, 1889.






Lulu Josephine Noe Darling merits, Gonzales, Monterey, CA 1889




Sister Julia Ann Noe wrote the first entry in the book, dated Dec. 28, 1891, from Gonzales, Monterey, CA.




Leland S. David L. Noe, Lulu's brother, wrote in her book on Feb. 28, 1892, from Gonzales, Monterey, CA.



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



W.P. Noe, a well known and highly respected old time resident of this community, died at the home of his son John Noe, just east of this city, on Friday, June 5th, after a prolonged struggle with ailments incident to his advance age. Funeral services were conducted the following afternoon, **the interment being at Rock Point cemetery**, where Rev. A. Coslet delivered a brief but touching address.

Nita sent estate papers concerning John Noe's estate. John died in 1919. Apparently John was in ill health; he and his mother went to sister Lulu Noe Darling's ranch. Mary and John "brought with them to the said ranch....four cows, five heifers, one steer, three heifer calves, fourteen hens, one rooster, nine turkeys, one old hay mower, one old cream separator, one old saddle, three five gallon cream cans, one old cooking stove, one iron kettle, one old aun and one phonograph and some records, six old chairs, one dining room extension table, some cooking utensils and dishes, bedding and bedsteads." The court papers go on to say that after John died, Mary left all the livestock and personal property at the Darlings, saying she would retrieve it when she was able. Years passed. Critters died. Critters were born. The Darlings continued to take care of the livestock. Finally, the Darlings filed a lien upon the livestock for the expenses involved in taking care of them for several years. The Darlings also claimed that they paid \$50 for taking John's body to the City of Medford, OR, and they paid \$92.50 for a casket and hearse. They claimed that Mary Noe owed them \$1834.08. She replied that they unlawfully exchanged her livestock, and used her livestock for their own purposes, etc. Mary claimed that he profited from milking her cows, for instance. That the cows reproduced, and they profited from the new calves. She also claimed that they used and wore out her personal possessions. Of course, when she enumerates the possessions, they aren't old, but of good quality. Even mentions a phonograph with more than 100 records. She is counterclaiming they used her possessions, and they owe her money. Ultimately, Mary was given the remainder of John's estate after his expenses were paid, which was \$443.25.

After John's death, as per Nita's story, Mary moved in with her daughter Lulu and her husband, Ralph Darling.





1886 Voters Reg, Monterey County, CA



There's a FAG memorial created for John at Fort Klamath Cemetery, even though his death cert says he was buried at Rock Point, which is where his parents were buried. I've contacted the person who made the Fort Klamath memorial, to see what source was used, and received the information that FAG had ownership of the memorial, and that they couldn't do anything in terms of researching or explaining why "J" had made that memorial at Klamath.

Nita sent estate papers concerning John Noe's estate. John died in 1919. Apparently John was in ill health; he and his mother went to sister Lulu Noe Darling's ranch. Mary and John "brought with them to the said ranch....four cows, five heifers, one steer, three heifer calves, fourteen hens, one rooster, nine turkeys, one old hay mower, one old cream separator, one old saddle, three five gallon cream cans, one old cooking stove, one iron kettle, one old gun and one phonograph and some records, six old chairs, one dining room extension table, some cooking utensils and dishes, bedding and bedsteads." The court papers go on to say that after John died, Mary left all the livestock and personal property at the Darlings, saying she would retrieve it when she was able. Years passed. Critters died. Critters were born. The Darlings continued to take care of the livestock. Finally, the Darlings filed a lien upon the livestock for the expenses involved in taking care of them for several years. The Darlings also claimed that they paid \$50 for taking John's body to the City of Medford, OR, and they paid \$92.50 for a casket and hearse. They claimed that Mary Noe owed them \$1834.08. She replied that they unlawfully exchanged her livestock, and used her livestock for their own purposes, etc. Mary claimed that he profited from milking her cows, for instance. That the cows reproduced, and they profited from the new calves. She also claimed that they used and wore out her personal possessions. Of course, when she enumerates the possessions, they aren't old, but of good quality. Even mentions a phonograph with more than 100 records. She is counterclaiming they used her possessions, and they owe her money. Ultimately, Mary was given the remainder of John's estate after his expenses were paid, which was \$443.25.

Thomas vs. Darling Order giving the defendant until June 19 to move, demur, answer or otherwise plead, was issued this morning by Judge Leavitt in the case of Bert C. Thomas as administrator of the estate of John M. Noe against R. L. Darling, in which it is sought to obtain damages approximating \$6,000 from Darling for the alleged wrongful conversion to his own use of the personal property of the Noe estate.



When A Policeman is Not a Policeman---Why?
City Marshal L.S. Noe Answers Riddle

by Brutally Beating Prisoner
Empties Gun After Fugitive on Street
Noe Declines to Appear Against PrisonerPolice Officer in Toils on Serious Assault Charge

An attempted arrest in which the city marshal of Gold Hill upheld the majesty of the law by beating Joe Shoemaker, of Galls Creek, across the jaw with a clubbed revolver, permitted his prisoner to escape and then emptied his gun at the fugitive during a stern chase down Front Street, constituted an official fiasco on Christmas night that reflects but little credit on law and order.

Inspired by Christmas "cheer", Shoemaker sought admittance to the dance hall where Marshall Noe officiated as doorkeeper, and was refused entrance. It is reported that words passed between the police officer and Shoemaker at this time, and the latter was ordered to make himself scarce. Upon his departure Marshal Noe followed him to the sidewalk, declared him under arrest, and without the slightest show of resistance being offered, brutally struck him with clubbed gun, cutting a vicious gash in his left cheek and sending his victim dazed and reeling into the mud of the street. With face streaming blood Shoemaker broke into a run down the street, the marshal in close pursuit. Here again the gun was brought into play, bystanders testifying that at least four or five shots were fired at the fugitive, with an indifferent aim that made the curious ones along the street dodged hastily indoors.

Shoemaker escaped across the bridge, but was brought back by friends, who overtook him. The character of the wound inflicted by the gun butt was such that it was feared his jaw had been broken, and he was immediately taken to the office of Dr. R.C. Kelsey, where the wound was examined and dressed. Although the injury was not so serious as supposed, the gaping wound upon his left cheek will afford a permanent scar of considerable area as a

Following this, Shoemaker was left at liberty, with the understanding that he would be called upon to answer a charge of disorderly conduct the following morning. In the absence of Recorder Wetherell, Mayor Kelsey in his capacity as ex-officion police judge, required Marshall Noe to appear against Shoemaker, but was informed by the office that he had given his prisoner full liberty and had no charge to present against him.

Notwithstanding the fact that Marshal Noe "considerately"

Notwithstanding the fact that Marshal Noe "considerately" dropped that charge against him, noemaker has sworn out a warrant charging the Gold Hill peace offi r with "assault with a dangerous weapon", and it is more than likely that the preliminary hearing

will bind him over to the next term of circuit court.

That Marshal Noe did not succeed in shooting down the fugitive or in wounding any one of the innocent pedestrians may be credited more to luck than intent, while his refusal to appear the following morning against a character sufficiently desperate to warrant gunplay the previous night is a conclusive commentary on the trivial

nature of the offense.

A number of reliable and unprejudiced citizens were witnesses to the affair, and unite in agreeing that the attack upon Shoemaker was not only unprovoked, but that in their capacity as citizens they stood ready to assist the marshal in making the arrest had their assistance been either necessary or desired.

Mayor Kelsey stated that while in his opinion Noe had far exceeded his authority as an officer, the council would decline to ask for his resignation or to take action in the matter unless

requested to do so by a petition of the citizens.

Gold Hill is not a last stamping ground for wild west marshals or wild west methods. Its citizens demand a police administration that will safeguard the interests of the city without recourse to brutality or reckless gun play. Granting that either an excess of excitement or fear prompted Marshall Noe to so dangerously overstep the bounds of prudence and authority, the safety of the general public would seem to require that the council accept his resignation as soon as it can be conveniently proferred. CITY MARSHAL IS ACCUSED

Gold Hill Peace Officer Charged With Assault With Weapon.

GOLD HILL, Or., Dec. 31.—(Special.)
—Held under \$500 bonds to appear at
the next term of Circuit Court at
Jacksonville, L. S. Noe, city peace officer for Gold Hill, awaits trial on the
charge of committing assault with a
dangerous weapon while discharging
his duties as Marshal.

On Christmas night Noe attempted the arrest of "Dode" Shoemaker, a Galls Creek rancher, who had contracted for more than his share of the holiday "good cheer," and was considered by the Marshall to be contributing to a disturbance of the public peace. Shoemaker refused arrest and was dealt a terrific blow on the right cheek by the Marshal, who employed the butt of his heavy service revolver. Dazed and bleeding, Shoemaker stag-gered into the mud of the thoroughfare and broke into a run. It is alleged that Noe pursued, firing four or five shots at the fugitive, who made his escape otherwise unscathed. Friends brought back the prisoner, who appeared the following morning to answer the complaint against him, only to be notified that Marshal Noe declined to appear against him.

Subsequently Shoemaker swore out a warrant for Noe's arrest on the charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, and at the preliminary hearing the Marshal pleaded "not guilty," although waiving examination. From the evidence produced by the Prosecuting Attorney's office it was shown without denial that Shoemaker had not resisted arrest and that his hands were at his sides when the blow which laid open his cheek was struck. Prosecuting Attorney-elect E. E. Kelly bitterly arraigned the defendant in his concluding address, and upon the testimony submitted the court held him in \$500 bond to await trial. Porter

Neff, a Medford attorney appeared for the defendant.

Waive Examination At Hearing
Marshal of Gold Hill Wears Stare Pending

At a preliminary hearing before Judge Morelock on Saturday last, City Marshal L.S. Noe was bound over to the next term of circuit court in the sum of \$500, charged with assault upon a person of "Dode" Shoemaker with a dangerous weapon. Noe entered

a plea of not guilty, but waived examination.

The prosecution called as witnesses but a comparatively small number of the spectators of the affray, which occurred on Christmas night. At that time, following an altercation in the dance hall, Marshal Noe followed Shoemaker to the street and attempted his arrest, striking him with a revolver butt and severely cutting open his left cheek, Afterward, it is alleged, the marshal pursued his escaping prisoner down Front Street toward the river, firing a number of shots, and employing profane and abusive language.

J.L. Hammersly, the first witness called, was present at the first meeting of the two in the opera house. Heard the passage of words between them, and although considering them to be in a joking spirit, persuaded Shoemaker to leave the hall with him to avoid possible trouble. Saw Shoemaker a few moments afterward struck down by the marshal on the street, but did not see any act upon his part to warrant the blow. Witness saw the first shots fired, and testified that the spurt of flame from the muzzle appeared to be nearly or upon a level.

Miss Norah Newton, night operator at the Home Telephone company's office testified that she heard the sounds of the chase as it had past her station, and heard the shots fired. That immediately previous to the first shot she heard a profane threat shouted, apparently at the fugitive, and that she recognized the voice as that of Marshal Noe. Upon cross examination Miss Newton stated that she did not hear an explicit command to "halt" or "stop" and that the language employed was unprefaced by any such

commands.

The testimony of Arthur Boggis corresponded with that given by his companion, Hammersly, the two having accompanied Shoemaker from the hall. He did not see Shoemaker offer resistance at anytime, but saw the marshal strike him down, and witnessed the firing of several shots at the fugitive. Upon cross examination by Attorney Neff, the witness declared that from the line of flame apparent, the gun could not have been greatly elevated, if at all.

J.H. Beeman testified that he was a bystander at the time of Shoemaker's exit from the hall, and saw the police officer draw his gun before assaulting him. That he did not see any show of resistance to the arrest, and that he plainly saw the direct flame from two of the shots fired at the fugitive and heard Marshal Noe threaten Shoemaker with pro[fane]-language.

Shoemaker was next called, and recounted his actions on the night in question admitting that he had been drinking freely, and might have been partially intoxicated at the time of the trouble. He denied having offered resistance to the officer in any manner,

or to have had any suspicion of impending difficulties before the official gun butt connected with his jaw.

The prosecution then declined to call any more witnesses as it was understood that Marshal Noe would waive examination, which

Prosecuting attorney-elect E.E. Kelly, scathingly arranged the defendant in his concluding address and summing up of testimony pointing out the dangers of misplaced official authority and asking that Noe be bound over to the next term of circuit court.

Judge Morelock fixed the amount of bail at \$500, which was promptly provided and the defendant released from custody.

Perjury Charge is Growth of Police Assault Case

Upon complaint of chief of police Dave Noe, of this city, a warrant was issued by Justice of the Peace Taylor, of Medford, for the arrest of J.H. Beeman, of this city. Mr. Beeman is accused of perjury, the charge being based upon the alleged affidavits of certain citizens whose names have not year been made public.

The complaint originated in the notorious affair of last Christmas night, when the chief of police, in attempting the arrest of Dode Shoemaker, struck him in the face with his service revolver, cutting a deep gash. As Shoemaker fled, the officer fired several shots after him, declaring afterwards that the shots were not aimed to inflict injury but to frighten the fugitive into stopping. Mr. Beeman, among several others was summoned as a witness to the affair, when Chief Noe was arrainged upon the charge of assault with a deadly weapon. In every respect Mr. Beeman's testimony tallied with that of other witnesses, and his presence as a bystander has never been questioned until the perjury charge was unexpectedly sprung.

Mr. Beeman was released upon his own recognizance, to await the preliminary hearing, which was subsequently announced to have been "indefinitely postponed." It is understood that he will demand an early hearing upon the charge, of which he has no apprehensions. Various bystanders and witnesses will be called to testify to Mr. Beeman's presence at the affair, which is the point

in question. It is the general belief he will cleared of the charge, receiving complete vindication when the testimony is submitted.

Beeman Freed of Perjury Charge

Failing to make good the perjury charge preferred by ex-city officer David Noe against J.H. Beeman, of this city, arrainged in Justice Taylor's court at Medford, Saturday afternoon last, the cost of the action were upon motion of prosecuting attorney, E.E.

Kelly, assessed against the complainant.

The case, which occasioned great local interest, was the outgrowth of trouble which occurred on Christmas night, when Officer Noe attempted the arrest of Dode Shoemaker. As a result of the methods employed Noe, was subsequently given a hearing on the charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, and bound-over to the grand jury. Governed by the failure of the complaining witness, Shoemaker, to appear the grand jury refused to indict. Mr. Beeman, who was present at the encounter, was summoned as a witness both in the original hearing and the rendering of evidence to the grand jury. Alleging that this witness was elsewhere at the time of the encounter, and in no wise a witness, Officer Noe instituted the perjury proceeding against Mr. Beeman.


At the hearing of the case on Saturday last several witnesses were called to testify to Mr. Beeman's presence elsewhere at the time of the affray, but as the testimony of others who witnessed the affair and conversed with Mr. Beeman at the time was conclusive as to his presence when Officer Noe attempted the arrest, the testimony of the contrary was construed to be of a mistaken nature and the case was summarily dismissed, the court completely

exonerating Mr. Beeman of the charge.

So conclusive was the evidence, that upon the conclusion of the case the prosecuting attorney offered as a motion, which was adopted by the court, that the costs of the action be assessed against the complainant, Mr. Noe.



Thieves Steal on Immense Scale

For several months residents of the Gold Hill neighborhood have been missing a widely variegated assortment of trinkets ranging from a few tons of copper wire, a blacksmith shop, a 300-pound anvil, finally to a complete nearly new Ford car. The residents who were relieved of the foregoing articles finally became slightly irritated and began an investigation which resulted in a raid upon the home of David Noe, a former Gold Hill marshal. The raid revealed the Ford carefully taken to pieces and stored beneath the floor, also the blacksmith equipment and a goodly amount of copper wire. The raid was made by Mr. Martin, Prosecuting Attorney E. E. Kelly, Sheriff Singler and Deputy Sheriff "Curly" Wilson.

The raid was a complete surprise to the wholesale thieves, being made just at the noon hour. Mr. Kelly guarded the front entrance and Deputy Wilson the back door, which opened into a small alley. The search was made on a warrant sworn to by Mr. Martin of the power company, charging Noe with the theft of copper wire. An electric motor was found and many other pieces of valuable machinery. Among the spoils was a good deal of copper, and the authorities believe they have found the vandals who relieved the Ashland mine of much valuable copper and destroyed several hundred dollars' worth of machinery.

When the sheriff and Martin entered the building Noe attempted to escape through a side window in the building into his neighbor's back yard, and being hidden from view by a high board fence, got three blocks away before being seen by Deputy Wilson. "Curly's" athletic training

stood him in good stead, and after a hard sprint he captured Noe. Noe was armed with a 38-calibre revolver.

Smith, Noe's partner in crime, had hidden himself in a closet and was later arrested. The search revealed many parts of the Ford car stolen last November from Dave Miller of Gold Hill.

The men were given a hearing before Justice of the Peace Taylor and were bound over to the grand jury on \$2,000 bonds and are now in the county jail. Noe pretended to be insane.

A further search of the premises and of Noe's second hand store disclosed a pit which the officers believed was used for counterfeiting and for burning insulation from wire. A large hook made from three-fourths inch gas pipe was also discovered, which when connected to a long handle made a giant hook about sixteen feet long. The men were believed to have used this to lower stolen wire to a pit in the bottom of Rogue river. Shipping receipts for 1,000 pounds of copper were found, and also many letters pertaining to the sale of the Ford and other machinery.

NOE BURNED AUTO BODY AND THREW REMAINS IN RIVER

David Noe and Bob Smith, charged with stealing D. H. Miller's automobile and with other thefts, sent for District Attorney Kelly yesterday and each made a confession of the theft of the ear. The confessions of Noe and Smith also implicate others with petty stealing in junk.

According to the confession, the car was taken from Miller's garage in the night time, driven over Blackwell hill to Tolo, then down the river on the west side to a point midway between Gold Hill and Gold Rav. Here it was driven off the road in a chaparral thicket and covered with

a chaparral thicket and covered with brush. Later it was dismantled, all the parts except the frame and body being loaded into a wagon and transported to Gold Hill. The body, it is claimed, was accidentally set on fire and burned and then thrown into a deep channel of Rogue river. Charred wood, burned parts of the car and a pile of brush amply corroborate this part of the story. Both are anxious to enter pleas of guilty when the grand jury is convened and will receive sentences for grand largeny.

Noe claims that he was led into the matter through fear of Smith, who, he claims, coerced him into the theft of the machine. On the other hand, Smith does not attempt to evade any responsibility for his part of the transaction.

The officers found too much evidence of a long-continued business of petty thieving to take much stock in Noe's story of undue influence, and he was advised that his case was not one for elemency.


FIVE INDICTMENTS FOR VARIOUS CRIMES BY GRAND JURY



Circuit Court Grinds Away

GLENDALE MAN SUES

JUDGES OF ELECTION

Roseburg, Or. May 4.—Denied the privilege of voting at the election held in the city of Glendale on April 1, of this year, becauses he was not the owner of real estate, F. C. Ladd, a merchant of that city has filed suit in the circuit court against the three precinct judges, C. P. Totten, William Nail and D. N. Snyder, demanding \$500 damages from each of them for the "humiliation" which, he says, he suffered. The complaint recites that the action of the judges was

based on a provision of the city charter that no non-freeholder shall be eligible to vote at a city election. This provision, the complaint declares, directly contravenes the state constitution, which, as interpreted by the supreme court in a test case several years ago, gives a citizen the right to vote at a municipal election, whether he owns real estate or not. The court also held that the election judges would be amenable to actions for damages. Ladd is a socialist and was a candidate for office at the Glendale election.

IMPORTANT DAMAGE CASE,

Is Attracting Attention of Judge Hamilton Today.

The case of F. C. Ladd vs. C. P. Totten, William Nail and D. N. Snyder, an action to recover damages in the sum of \$500, is attracting the attention of a jury in the circuit court this afternoon. The plaintiff is represented by Attorneys J. D. Wurtzburger, of Grants Pass, and B. L. Eddy, of Roseburg. Attorneys Dexter Rice and George Neuner are looking after the interests of the defendants.

The case was originally brought by Ladd to recover damages in the sum of \$500 as a result of the procedure of the election board, composed of the defendants, in refusing to allow him to vote at the recent city election held at Glendale. Ladd claims that the election board enforced the provisions of the property clause which is to the effect that only qualified voters holding real estate may vote at a city election. Ladd contends that the enforcement of such a clause is in direct violation of the constitution and consequently cannot be sustained by the courts.

The defendants claim that they acted according to law and thereby are not subject to pay damages. The

JURY UNABLE TO AGREE ON VERDICT.

Celebrated Glendale Election Case Attracts Unusual Attention.

After a deliberation of nearly seven hours the jury empanelled to listen to the evidence in the case of F. C. Ladd vs. C. P. Totten, William Nail and D. N. Snyder, informed Judge Hamilton that they were unable to agree shortly after 12 o'clock last night and were discharged.

Ladd brought the suit against Totten, Snyder and Nail to recover the sum of \$500 in damages, together with attorney fees in a reasonable sum. Ladd claimed that the defendants, who were members of the election board at the recent city election held at Glendale, refused to allow him to vote for the reason that he failed to own real property. Ladd claimed that the "property clause", on which the defendants based their refusal, was unconstitutional and

had so been held by the Oregon supreme court. He contended that he possessed all the qualifications of a voter, and consequently was entitled to damages. The defendants alleged that Ladd was not sincere, and on the contrary had made no effort to vote.

According to certain members of the jury the vote stood seven in favor of the defendants and five in favor of the plaintiff. It is said the case will be appealed to the supreme court for final-disposition.

Where the Responsibility Rests.
Glendale, Or., Oct. 11—To the Editor of The Journal—On November 5 next, by the initiative and referendum, every elector in the state of Oregon is forced to render a jurge's verdict on which will rest all the responsibility of a judgment for the taking of human life. If the elector votes against the repeal of the capital punishment law or fails to vote for the repeal of said law, he thereby sanctions and assumes the full measure of responsibility of every legal execution within the state during the time that the capital punishment law

ishment law remains in force.

Through the right of franchise, the elector is forced to assume the responsibility of a free moral agent, whether he will or not, without the possibility of shifting his responsibility to the governor who signs the death warrant, the judge who pronounces sentence, the jury which convicts, the hangman who springs the trap or the attorney who prosecutes. There is no way, Mr. Elector, for you to evade the issue—you have, under the initiative and referendum, become the employer, with all the employer's responsibility, and governor, judge, jury, prosecuting attorney and hangman are but employes hired by you to perform the service; as directed by you at the ballot box, and on the shoulders of the elector will rest the responsibility of the combined acts of your official employes whom you have hired to send your fellow beings to the gallows.

If you will glance down the pages of history you will find the record of the execution of many innocent persons where the innocent have suffered for the guilty; and as long as we execute, we will be taking the lives of the innocent for the crimes of the guilty, as man has always been and probably always will be prone to err, and every elector who votes against the repeal or fails to vote on the bill for the repeal of the capital punishment law will be morally responsible for the taking of every innocent life that is sacrificed in the enforcement of the death penalty.

Under the old system, the responsibility did not rest on the individual elector, who had nothing directly to do with the enactment or enforcement of law, but under the present regime it is impossible for any elector to escape the responsibility for the effect of the law which he helps to place on the statute books of the state. Failure to vote against is equivalent to voting for. Never before were the electors of Oregon compelled to solve such a vital question as the repeal of the capital punishment law, and when the ballots cast on November 5 are counted we may be able to flash the news from the Pacific to the Atlantic that Oregon has taken one more step toward civilization by repealing her most barbaric law, capital punishment. 





Lulu Josephine Noe Darling merits, Gonzales, Monterey, CA 1889







June 13, 1914, vol. 17, no. 6 W.P. Noe Passes Away at Home of Son Near City W.P. Noe, a well known and highly respected old time resident of this community, died at the home of his son John Noe, just east of this city, on Friday, June 5th, after a prolonged struggle with ailments incident to his advance age. Funeral services were conducted the following afternoon, the interment being at Rock Point cemetery, where Rev. A. Coslet delivered a brief but touching address.

William Perry Noe was a native of old Missouri, Ray County, where he was born in 1836. When a young man he emigrated to Nevada, where he was a participant in the pioneer activities of that restless territory. Something like sixteen years ago he came with his family to this section of southern Oregon, where they have since resided. He is survived by his wife, and seven children; Mrs. Mae Reynolds, of Portland, Mrs. F.C. Ladd of Glendale, Mrs. Ralph Darling, John and Dave Noe, of this city, Mrs. Wm. Cox of Shasta County, Calif., and Mrs. J.N. Armstrong, of Dundee. All but the two last named were present.
