I don't know where the birth dates for Granville and Mary Ann came from in this Clark County, MO, compilation of cemetery records, but could have been from their tombstones, where they show the death date and the age at death. I'm using Mary Ann's birth date from her son's Day Book.

My dad (H. Finley Downes) and I visited the cemetery with cousin Keith Owens in 2013. The cemetery is on the Earl Hunziker farm, and we needed permission to visit. There are only the two tombstones, which in 2013 were broken and on the ground. Hunziker uses the area for running cattle, and there is no attempt to maintain the area as a cemetery. Keith and my dad talked about asking if they could put a fence around the stones, but I don't know what became

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of that. Keith died not long after that, and I know that my dad didn't take the action. Dad died in 2020.

You can see from the picture that Keith took in 2006, that the stones were in better shape than when I saw them in 2013.

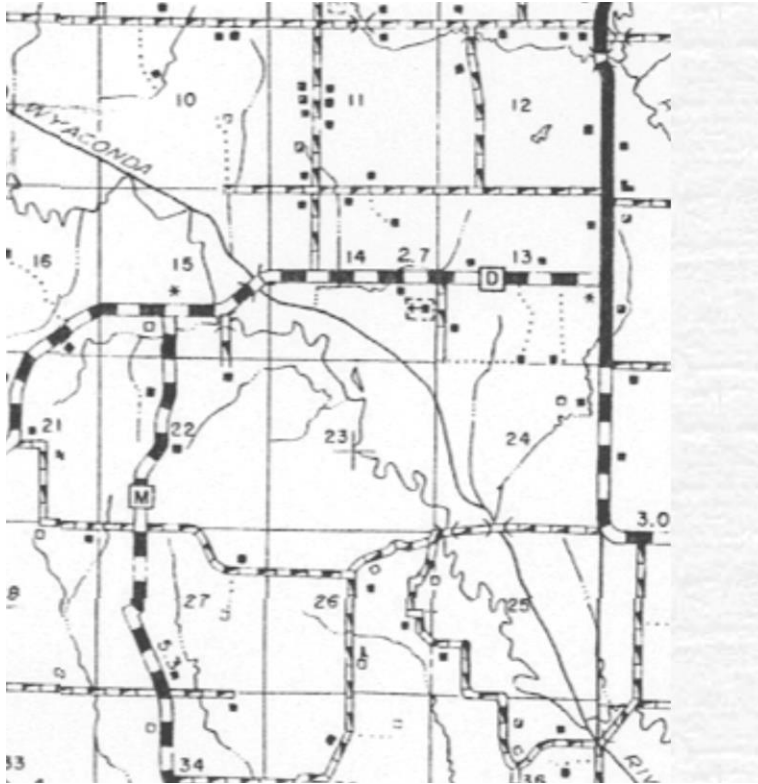

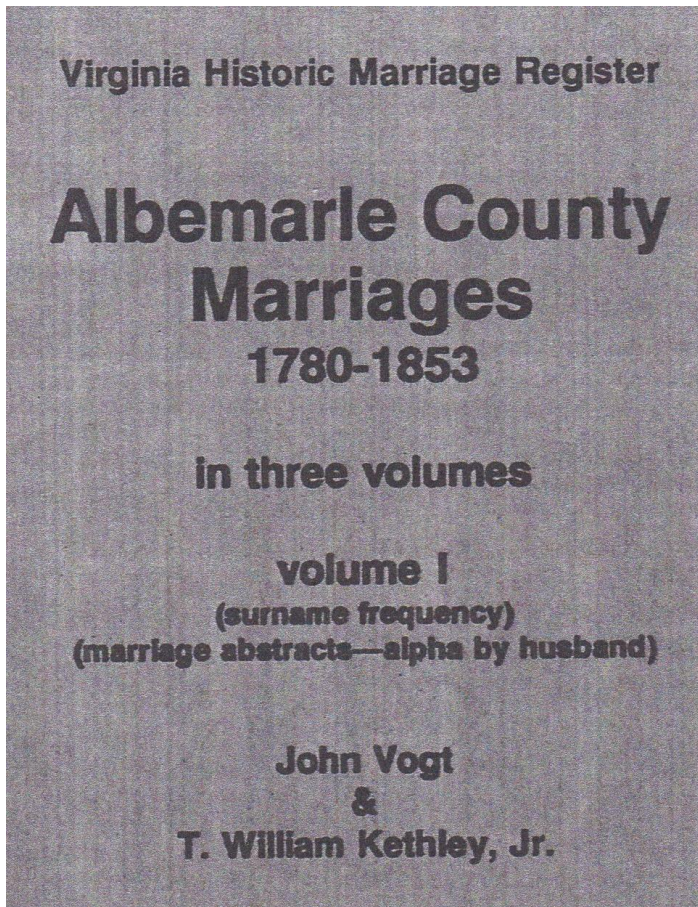
Granville

Not much is known about Granville prior to his marriage to Mary Ann Hanvey. There have been several researchers who have tried to locate him, his parents, etc., but haven't had much luck.

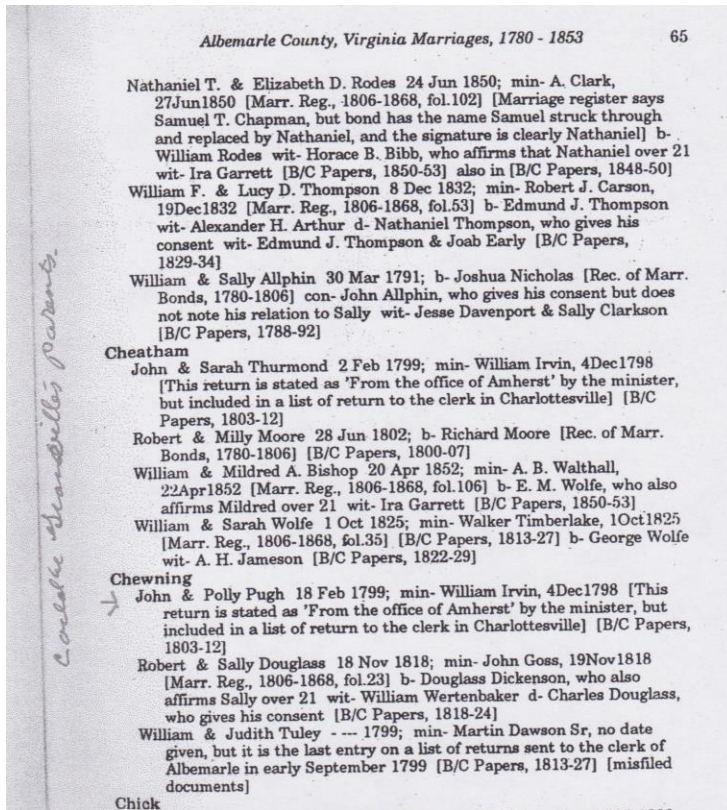
There was a post online (from Sarah to Ruth Eubanks, who is a daughter of Ernest Chewning). This post mentions that Granville may have been a colonel in the Revolutionary war.

Nita Chewning sent me these pages from Albemarle, VA, suggesting possible parents for Granville. Other than the last name, I don't have any connection with us yet.

There may have been a court case involving Granville in Virginia. Nita sent me information (in 2008, perhaps) concerning this; I don't know what her source was.

Granville Chewing and early lawsuit, from Nita Chewing

We first find record of Granville when he was married to Mary Ann Hanvey in Front Royal, Frederick County Virginia on August 16, 1832. Although on the document obtained we they have Mary Ann's last name spelled HAINNEY. This is not so, we have also found in the pages of a family bible and a day book written by John Washington Chewing that her last name was spelled HANVEY.

We have found no records of where he was before that date.

We next find Granville when he came to Missouri after his eldest child John was born, and we next find where he bought land in Union Township Missouri in 1838. He at that time bought 240 acres.

We found his name listed on a page from a book about the History of Lewis, Clark, Knox and Scotland Counties, Missouri. This would be on page 253 of that book.

We next find him listed on the 1840 and 1850 census using the name TUNING. Here is said that the spelling is different but it is pronounced CHEWNING. This researcher does not know if he was using this spelling or if the person writing the information spelled it as such. In Sept of 2002 the Chancery Records of VA released a file containing a law suit William Broy and

Granville Chewning (Trunon) was obtained by Nita Chewning.

There are pages with notes and depositions that were sent back and forth from Winchester to Front Royal VA.

Granville took boats full of merchandise down river full of Flour and other goods to be sold. He did this down the Shenandoah River. Usually three boats at a time with a crew.

William Broy ran a small store and on some of the trips had Granville take his barrels of Flour down river to the market and sell them for him.

He made a deal with Granville that he would supply three of his own boats (BROYS) and hire men to load the boats so when Granville came back from a trip the next boats would be waiting for him full and ready to go. This was to save time and be able to make more trips.

The catch was Granville had to take his flour for him and sell it without keeping any of it and splitting the profits for the trip 50/50 from the other merchandise he delivered. This worked for about 3 months or 3 trips? Granville returned and there were no boats waiting for him. So he figured (Granville) the deal was off and went and bought 3 boats from a Doctor Isaac N. Buck to take the merchandise from the other merchants down river.

Along the trip with his new boats he saw one of William Broy's boats being driven (Ferried) by a Jarvis Martin who was one of Wm. Broy's hired men. Granville asked him if Broy had sent him and the answer was yes. So at market Granville sold what was on the boats and Wm. Broy's flour barrels. He gave the flour money to Jarvis Martin and told him to take out of it what he thought he was owed and give the rest to Broy. Jarvis Martin kept all the money for himself. It seems from reading the files that Broy stayed in Winchester VA and Granville was in Front Royal, Frederick Co. VA and letter sent back and forth by mail for this law suit.

The court cases held at Winchester, Fredrick County. Boats went on the Shenandoah River to the district of Columbia and merchandise sold there. Wm. Broy was a merchant of a small store in Mt. Hope Shenandoah County.

Also mentioned is, boats went from Alexandria to Georgetown. Depositions taken in Front Royal, from Mrs. Lanes Home Nov. 3, 1834 given by Doctor Isaac N. Buck and Jarvis Martin.

In one of the pages it mentions that Granville had been doing this work for about 10 years. This page looks to be dated 1834 and signed by a man with last name CLARK.

This would have made Granville about 17 when he started on the river.

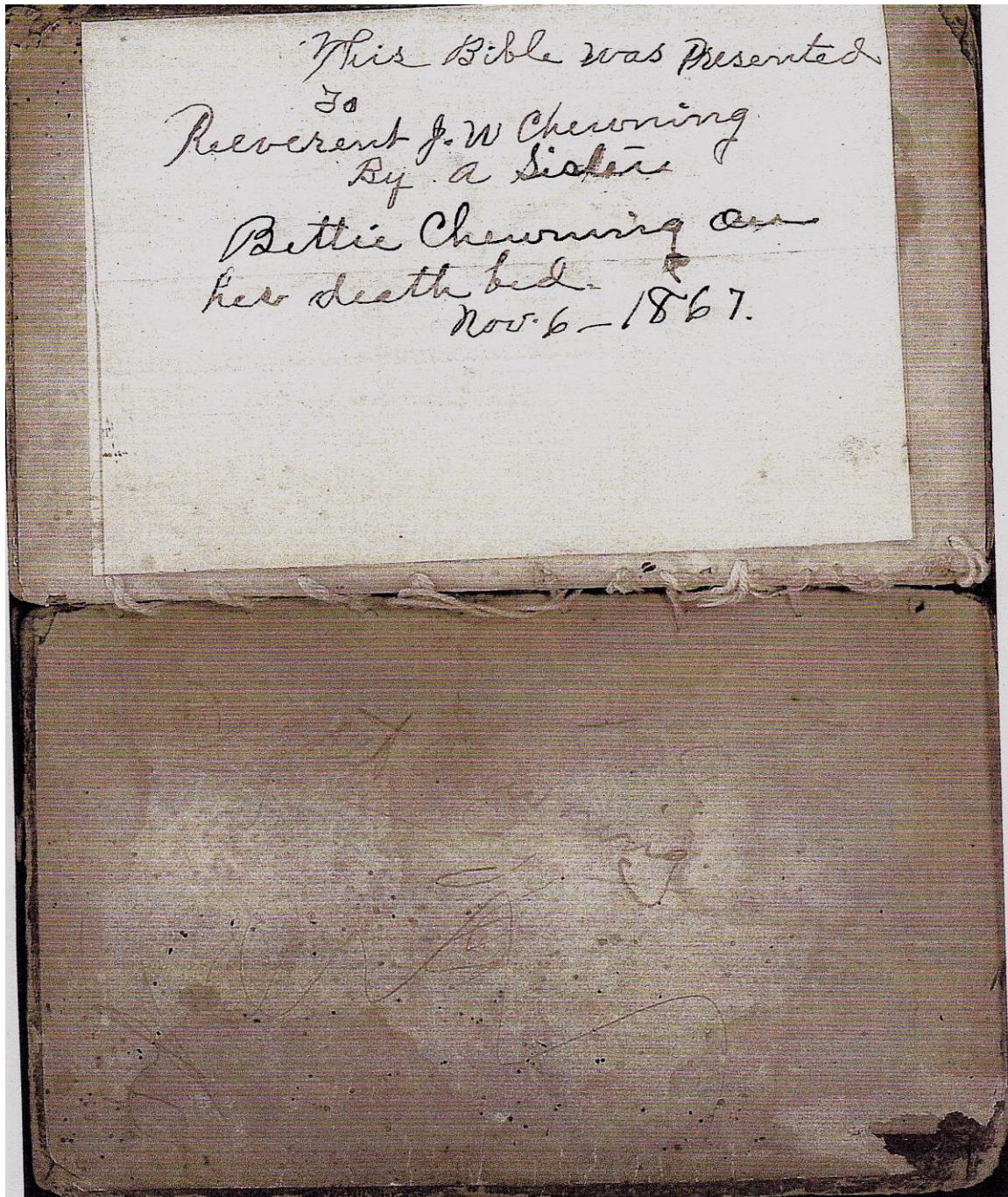
Could it have been that his father was a river worker or maybe Granville was indentured to learn a trade. It is unknown why he worked the river in VA and then became a farmer in Missouri

John Washington Chewning Bible and 'Day Book'

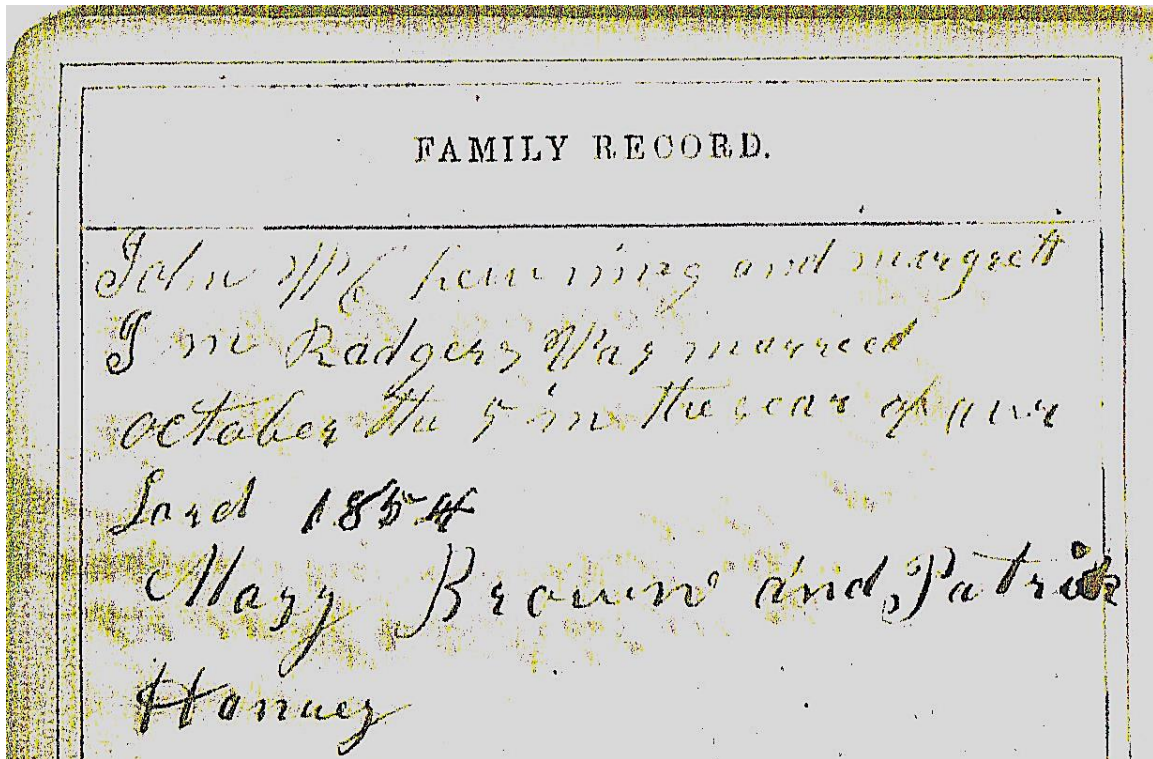
We have copies of a Bible that was given to John Washington Chewning by Bettie Chewning "on her death bed Nov. 6, 1867." (That's not Bettie's death date. She died Jan. 27, 1867.)

I added all the pages that I have from John's Bible at the end of the document.



John used the Bible to chronicle the birth, death and marriage dates of his family, including his children, his siblings, his parents and even perhaps his maternal grandparents, aunts and uncles.

This is from John's Bible. Notice that he mentions Patrick Hanvey and Mary Brown, who I think are Mary Ann Hanvey Chewning's parents.

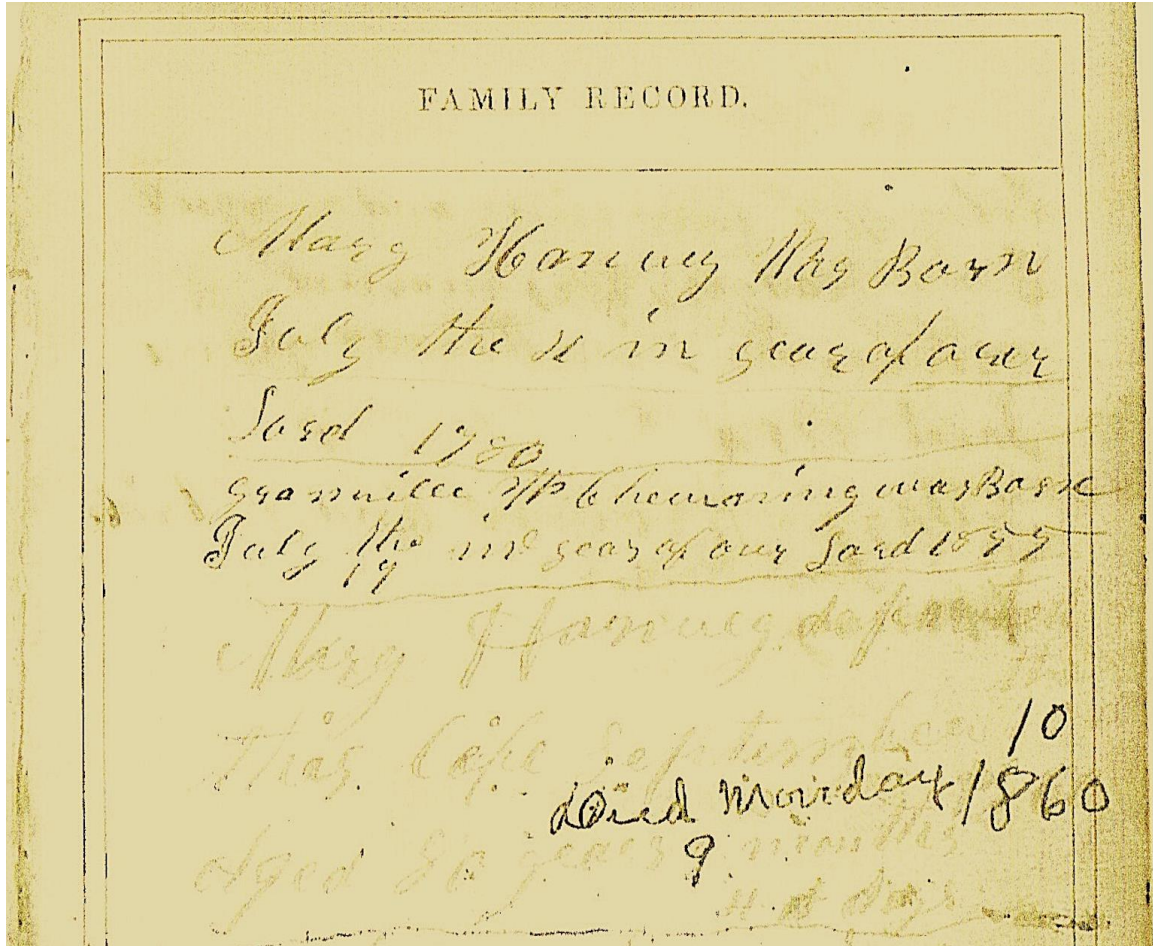

Mary Brown and Patrick Hanvey (no dates, no other description). They could have been John's grandparents.

Listed under *John W. Chewing and Margrett Jane Rodgers was married October the 5 in the year of our Lord 1854*

In the following clip, he mentions Mary Hanvey's birth and death dates. I believe he is talking about Mary Ann Polly Brown Hanvey, Mary Ann Hanvey Chewing's mother.

Granville W Chewing was Born July the 19?? in year of our Lord 1855. That refers to John Washington Chewing's son, Granville Washington Chewing, who was born 7/19/1855.

Mary Hanvey depart This life September 10 Age 80 years 9 months 4 days Died Monday 10 1860

September 10, 1860, was a Monday, by the way.

John Washington Chewing's 'Day Book:' Nita Chewing sent me the following page, which refers to John's 'Day Book.' I don't know if the Bible and the Day Book are one in the same or not. In other words, is this page a transcription from the Bible, or from another book? Is it in John handwriting, or someone else's?

There's a sticky note on the page: *page from Day Book written by Granville b. 1807 son John Washington Chewing*

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Listed are various Hanvey names and birthdates. While the book doesn't state who these Hanveys are in relation to Mary Ann Hanvey Chewning, John's mother, I believe they are Mary Ann Hanvey Chewning's siblings.

I can find censuses for some of these people: John H. Hanvey, James D(ecatur) Hanvey so far. Moses W. Hanvey died in Mississippi in 1874, I believe.

The Hanveys I have found that match the names and dates in John's Day Book lived in Leesburg, Loudon, VA, which is the neighboring county to the one in which we know that Granville and Mary Ann were married (Frederick Co., VA).

Chewning genealogy by Elizabeth Frances Bettie Chewning Vinson

I received these pages from Nita Chewning. The top portion of the first page is clearly written by an older person – and the marginal note says *'Written by Bettie F. Chewning Vinson before her death May 1, 1951.'*

Bettie F. was the daughter of John Washington and Martha Missouri Jane Hand Rodgers Chewning. Bettie was b. 8/27/1864, in Union Twp., Clark County, MO, and d. 5/1/1951, in Riverton, Fremont, WY.

The remainder of the first page and all of the second, which is clearly in a different hand, was written by Bettie's daughter, Verna Vinson Maxwell. Verna was b. 3/22/1889, in Lincoln, Benton, MO, and d. 5/22/1975, in Riverton, Fremont, WY.

I am assuming that Verna was either transcribing some of her mother's papers, or was writing down what her mother was dictating to her.

At the second half of the 2nd page, when Verna is referring to **'Grandma Chewning's life,'** she would have been talking about Martha Missouri Jane Hand Rodgers Chewning. **Grandpa Chewning would have been John Washington Chewning.**

Grandpa Chewning's father, then, was Granville Washington Chewning, who Verna says died of herbal tea poisoning.

The **John Chewning** she mentioned was probably John Henry Chewning (b. 11/10/1881, Camp Cole, Benton, MO; d. 7/11/1954, Kansas City, Jackson, MO) son of William Granville Patsy Chewning. John was born in Benton County, which is where John Washington Chewning lived, so it makes sense that he would visit that family. She mentions that *'some live around Kansas City.'*

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The **Spencer Chewning** she mentioned was Spencer Lee Chewning, nephew of John Washington Chewning. Spencer's father was Moses William Chewning (b. 1844; d. 1888).

She mentions **Frank Chewning**, who was Franklin Pierce Chewning, another son of William Granville Patsy Chewning. It's interesting that she said her grandfather John Washington Chewning informed Frank that his father had two marriages, having deserted his first wife and son (Cordelia A. Phillips Chewning, and son Willis P. Chewning). That was a well-guarded family secret, apparently. This visit had to occur before 1911, which was the year John Washington Chewning died.


I do not know much of grandma Chewing's life, only raised by her grandparents. Had some sisters and I think one brother. Her mother died in Benton Co. when I was a baby and I think was very old and blind.

Grandpa Chewing's father died from herb poisoning thru a mistaken wood tea. Of his 6 brothers some of them had big families up in Clark Co. Mo. I met 2 Chewing boys, one named John and one named Spencer when I was 12 or 14 years old but they were from 2 different families and came to visit grandpa's family but not together. Some live around K.C. Spencer lives in Monmouth Ill. Frank Chewing I remember. He was evidently the son of Granville William who deserted his first wife and spent several years in Calif. marrying again and lived in Okla with a big family. Anyway Grandpa C. family told him of his father's first married and of that family he never knew about. I think it is he who had twin brothers around K.C.

forties - do not have their birth & death dates.
My maternal grandparents - John Stinson - born
1806, died Dec. 1, 1890 and Louanna Adelaide Nicholson
Stinson - born Sept. 10, 1850, died July 19, 1930 - born in
Indiana.
My parents - Ernest William Chewing (Baptist minister)
born Jan. 17, 1879 in Clark Co., Mo. near Kahoka, Mo., died Dec. 18,

Hancock Co., Illinois near Elderville and Basco, Illinois, died Jul. 29, 1975.

This bill is filed to recover one half the profits of a trip to Scorpion with flour. The Plff admits that he was a partner in the trip with deft - and to recover \$17.70 cash received for his use as he says by deft on a sale of flour belonging to Plaintiff.

To say nothing at present of various other objections to the bill - as to jurisdiction or - the whole claim is exploded by the evidence -

The Separate Answer of Granville Chewing to a Bill of Complaint
submitted against him in the Circuit Superior Court of Law and
Chancery for the County of Frederick by William Brog:

the said William Brog (who at the time was keeper of a
small retail store at Mount Hope in Shenandoah County,
near said river), respondent entered into a verbal a-
greement with said Brog to the following effect - viz -

That said Brog, remaining at home, should provide all
the boats necessary and usual for respondent's trips, and
should also engage a sufficient quantity of loading for
the same, so that respondent and his hands should
not be delayed at all, but always on his return from
one trip have the usual number of boats and quantity
of loading ready to start down the river immediately
on another trip. Respondant agreed on his part, upon
having his boats and loading provided by Brog as beforemen-
tioned, to divide with said Brog the neat profits of each
trip so made. That is, the profits remaining after deducting
the value of the boats at \$25. each, and the hire of the
hands employed with the boats. The number of boats

which Brog was to have ready for respondent for each trip to be made under the agreement, was fixed on at the same time: They were to be five; and about Five hundred barrels of flour was the quantity of loading for the boats. The only inducement with respondent to enter into this arrangement was that he might, by avoiding any delay in procuring boats and loading, increase his number of trips during the season that the river was in order for boating profitably. — The said agreement did not embrace any particular number of trips, but respondent intended so long as Mr Brog complied with the precedent conditions on his part, to continue the arrangement during that spring. Three trips were made under said agreement, and the profits of each trip, as soon as each was made, were fully and fairly divided, according to its terms. When respondent returned from his third trip, he found that Brog had wholly failed to provide either boats or loading; and respondent ^{concluded} ~~concluded~~ ~~therein~~ that their bargain was at an end — as he considers he had a right to do. Respondent had twelve hands employed, and, as soon as he could, bought boats from a Bloch Bros, procured loading from Mr Wm Berry, and went on to the district on his own account. Respondent started with three boats, for which he had seven \$27. each. He was overtaken, at the Island Ford mills by Jarvis Martin, a boatman who had been in respondent's employ, with a boat belonging as respondent believes to

William Proy, and laden with 26 barrels of flour which was stated to be Mr Proy's. The four boats went down in company. Jarvis Martin made some disposition of Mr Proy's 26 barrels of flour in the district, under a written order, from Mr Proy directed to said Jarvis Martin and respondent; as respondent understood, though he never saw the order. Mr Proy's boat was sold (respondent thinks by Martin) and about paid for the provisions for its haul. Respondent denies that he is in any way responsible for the said flour or any part of it. The net profits of said trip were about fifty one dollars - not more. Respondent never considered that Proy was entitled to any portion of them. If he had been his share would have been \$25. 50 instead of \$70. - Proy brought suit at law against respondent for this same claim, which was dismissed. The proceedings will be exhibited as part of this answer.

The 1887 History of Clark County, MO, describes incidences within the county of bushwacking and atrocities, skirmishes and conflicts. The climate in Clark County was apparently less contentious than that in neighboring Lewis County, MO. One of Granville and Mary Ann's sons, William Granville Patsy Chewning, fought for the Union with a unit in Warren County, IL (his name is on the statue in the square at Monmouth, Warren, IL). Other than his involvement in the war, I don't have any other proof of what the rest of the family did during the war.

This from the 1887 History of Clark County, O, shows a little of what the climate for the Chewnings would have been during the war era.

Thomas farm east of Peakeville; Medill, at the crossing of the Keokuk & Western, and Wyaconda, one mile east of the Scotland County line. These are the names recommended to the company by the civil engineers of the road, and will most probably be permanently adopted.

SLAVERY.

Slavery of the negro, in Clark County, was co-existent with the early settlement of its territory. The first slave brought to the county, was "Aunt Cully" who came in 1829, with her master, Samuel Bartlett. She was born on the James River in Virginia, and is now about eighty-four years of age, and has her home in the county poor asylum. The first slaves were brought to the county, mostly by the settlers who came from Kentucky and Tennessee. Among these Col. Thomas C. Rutherford was probably the most extensive slave holder. Slavery however, was never approved by a majority of the citizens of the county, as the slaves were owned by only a few of the most wealthy. The "peculiar institution" never flourished here as it did in counties farther toward the interior of the State. This was probably owing to the fact that the county was bounded on two sides by free States, and that many of the settlers came therefrom.

To show the extent to which slavery finally existed in the county, the following list of the names of the slaveholders, and the number of taxable slaves owned by each, and annexed to his name, as shown by the tax duplicate for the year 1860 is hereby given: J. The total number of slave holders, as shown by the foregoing list, was 129, and the total number of slaves 405. The slaves were valued for taxation at \$171,300. The following year (1861) the total number of taxable slaves within the county was valued for taxation at only \$135,300. This reduction in their value was caused by the civil war which was then commenced, and which resulted in their emancipation.

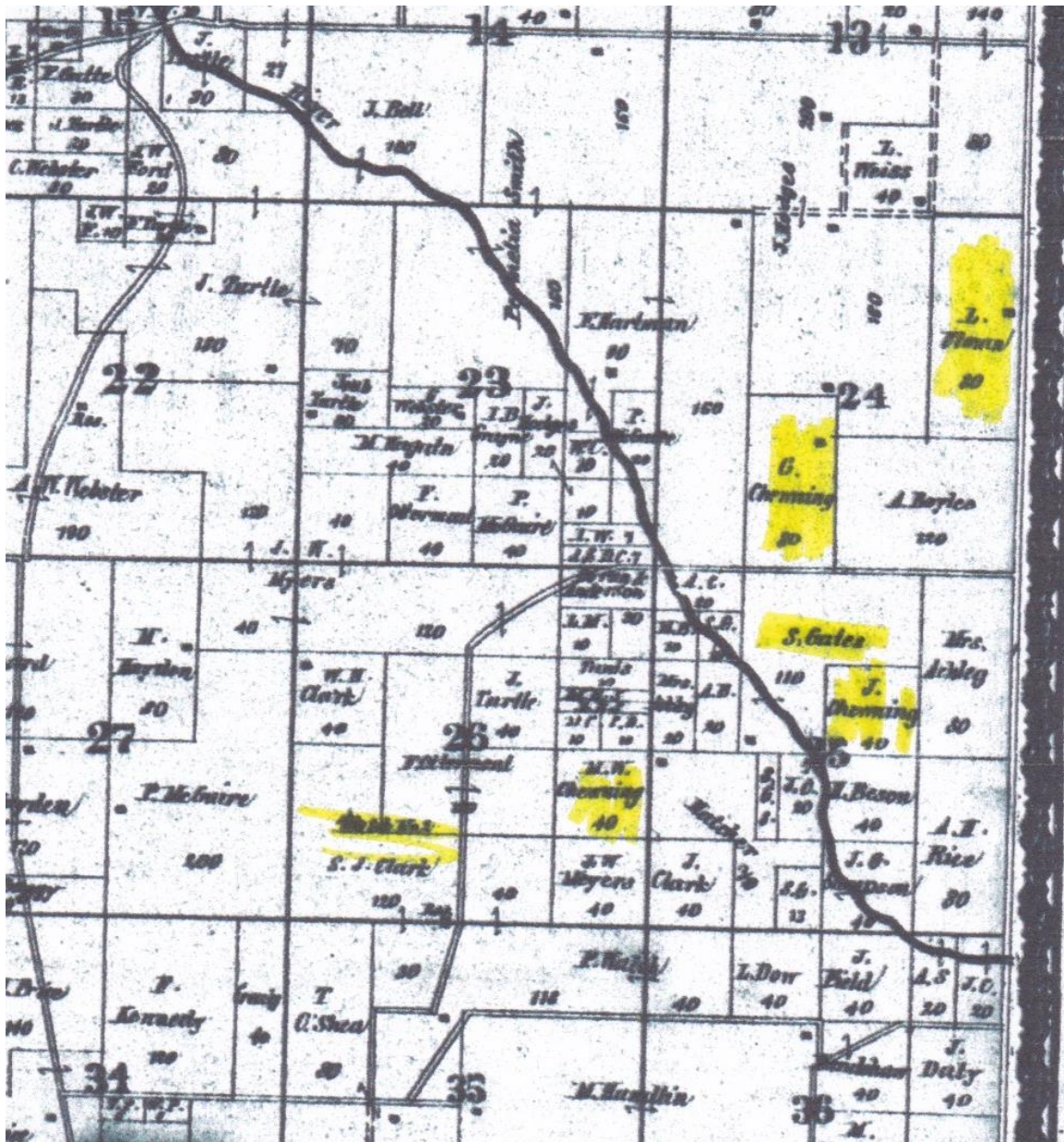

Bettie Chewning Vinson, who was a daughter of John Washington Chewning:

Grandpa Chewning's father died from herb poisoning thru a mistaken weed tea. Of his 6 brothers (she would be referring to John Washington's six brothers) some of them had big families up in Clark Co Mo. I met 2 Chewning boys, one named John and one named Spencer when I was 12 or 14 years old. Grandpa's family ent?? not together. Some live around K.C. Spencer lives in Monmouth Ill. Frank Chewning I remember. He was evidently the son of Granville William who deserted his first wife and spent several years in Calif, marrying again and lived in Okla with a big family. Anyway Grandpa C. family told him of his father's first married and of that family he never knew about. I think it is he who had twin brothers around K.C.

From the above, it would seem that Granville died from accidental poisoning.

We also learn that a **son** of Granville Washington and Mary Ann, Granville William, may have had two families, deserting the first, then marrying and starting a second family. (I've found this to be true.)

It's also accurate that Spencer Chewning lived in Monmouth, IL.

Granville died without a will, Mary Ann was made his administratrix on 2/29/1872



This document is very interesting in that it lists Granville and Mary Ann's heirs as of 1874. Apparently, daughters Catherine Chewning Tucker, Ann (who probably died in VA years before), Elizabeth A (who died in Clark County, MO, in 1867) and Rebeun were deceased.

I don't understand why Henrietta Chewning Ullman, who was listed as an heir when Mary Ann filed the administrator's bond, isn't listed as an heir here. She was alive, and living in Clark County, MO, in 1880. Unless it was Henrietta's indebtedness to Granville's estate:

According to an email from Nita Chewning, who is paraphrasing another source, Ruth Eubanks (who is a great granddaughter of Granville Chewning, I believe), says that Henrietta and her husband owed Granville \$900 when he died. There were three notes: one for \$400 due March 5, 1872, one for \$300 due April 5, 1874, and one for \$200 due April 5, 1876. Total with interest due was \$1923.74. Perhaps they gave up their portion in lieu of payment on the notes.

Mary Frances Chewning Noe (Know) had already moved to California, and obviously returned to sign these documents. On the 1870 census she was in Santa Cruz, CA.

For some reason, Granville William Chewning and his wife didn't come back to Clark County to sign the document. Granville William married for the second time in Clark County in 1870. He and Ella were in Saline, MO in 1880 census. I don't have an 1870 census for him.

We also learned that James was still single in 1874. He would later marry Mary E. Thomas Fetters, granddaughter of Newbold J. and Elizabeth Ann Beckner Cannon. Mary E. Thomas Fetters was also niece of Elizabeth Ann (Lizzie) Cannon Chewning, Moses' wife.
